J. Burch McMorram, State Superintendent of Public Works, today (Thursday, April 23, 1964) announced receipt of a low bid of \$392,534.30 from D & T. Francese Bros., Inc., of Watkins Glen, New York for the state tillage of Route 17 from the state tillage of Wallsville northeasterly 7.15

Chauffeurs Renewa Applications Mailed

Renewal applications for New will be mailed by the Department of Motor Vehicles today, (Thurs-

of Motor Vehicles today, (Thursday, April 30th).

Approximately 150,000 of the applications will go out to drivers whose licenses expire on Sunday, May 31, and who are eligible to renew. Eligible are those whose licenses are not under suspension

May 31, and who are eligible to renew. Eligible are those whose licenses are not under suspension or revocation.

Through the Department's data processing system, the ineligibles are eliminated and do not receive the renewal punch cards until their penalties have been satisfied. Motor Vehicle Commissioner William S. Hults reminds all applicants that the renewals in themselves are not licenses until the cards have been completely filled out and the fee of \$6 paid at the nearest motor vehicle office.
