

Stephen Baker Selected For Boy's State

J. Stephen Baker, son of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Baker of Maple St., has been selected to attend Boy's State at Colgate University, Hamilton, N. Y., it was announced recently by Ralph Burgett, Chairman of the Boy's State Committee for the Lynch-Burgett Post, 397.

In the selection of a candidate for this session, the local High School Principal is consulted and the young man is chosen after consideration of the following traits: Seriousness of purpose; Industry; Initiative; Influence; Concern for others; Responsibility and Emotional Stability.

The Candidate must be at least 15 years of age, have completed his junior year and intend to return to school in the Fall as a senior, and must have the following qualifications: Potential leadership; Ability to get along with others; Mentally alert and physically clean; Honest; Good personality; Vigorous; Cooperative and enthusiastic; Good Citizenship.

The Boy's State program will be held from June 21 thru 27 at Colgate University at Hamilton, N. Y., with the Candidates staying at the College Dorm and eating at the College dining hall.

Boy's State is a citizenship training program designed to meet the needs of our youth and is sponsored by the American Legion, Dept. of N. Y.

Boy's State inculcates individual responsibility to community, state and nation and the "learn by doing" concept is employed on the theory that good citizenship is only in part a matter of knowledge and understanding. Boy's State has been aptly described as a laboratory of practical political science.

The program is a pure democracy in that all citizens may vote and are eligible to hold office. As nearly as possible the government of Boy's State is patterned after the city, county and state governments of the State of New York.

The first part of the week we went over it to have some pictures cut at our neighbors Printing Shop and our idea was rather forcibly brought back to mind.

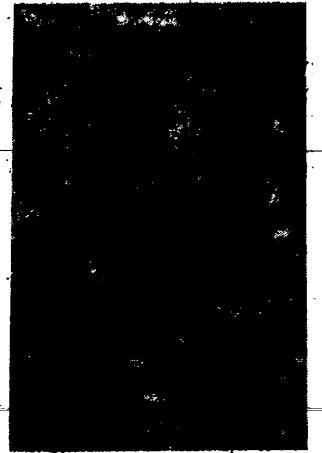

Alfred Ag-Tech President Dies

Walter C. Hinkle, 57, President of the State School of Agriculture and Technical Institute at Alfred, died unexpectedly Saturday, May 2, 1964 in the Bethesda Hospital following a heart attack.

Mr. Hinkle, a native of Kansas, taught Mathematics and Physics and Coached football, basketball and baseball teams in Kansas schools before joining the U. S. Agricultural Department Soil Conservation Department as a field engineer. He joined the Alfred faculty in 1937, where he developed the farm engineering program and was acting President at Alfred on three occasions before being President of Alfred Ag-Tech July 1, 1961.

He was an avid fisherman and hunter and a bowling enthusiast, as well as a trustee of the Union University Church of Alfred.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Vera Nobles Hinkle and a daughter, Mrs. Ardis Marie Savory of Michigan.

Farewell Services were held in Alfred Tuesday with interment in Alfred Rural Cemetery.
