Allegany County Civil Defense

Allegany County Civil Defense are pleased with the test conduc-ted Friday. The test showed that the "Go to your nearest shelter" program was again successful in its tryout.

The problems theoretically han dled were similar to those which would be acted upon in the even of a natural disaster. This second fortunately only a few times in Allegany County and then on a limited scale. Many of the acstaff during the operation were similar to those undertaken by Alaskan Civil Defense in the recent earthquake. These com-Alaskan Civil Derense in the re-cent earthquake. These com-prised problems of welfare feeding and housing, rehabilitation and resumption of normal activities.

Civil Defense staff administra tors found some things which did tors found some things which did not function smoothly, however, their comments were that such occurrences showed the unexpec-ted things which would happen in any real emergency and this al-lowed for planning to avoid these contingencies. To the staff, local deputy directors and plant pra-tection unit chiefs the test conduc-ted Friday May 15th reaffirmed ted Friday, May 15th reaffirmed the thinking that the program "Go to your nearest shelter" is workable and that communications facwhile not satisfactory, are improved.

The test was basicly formulated on the "after attack" period and the problems which would ensure. While consideration was given for while consideration was given for radiological problems still existent, the condition was quite similar to a natural disaster such as the Alaskan earthquake, and would have evolved into problems of welfase care, relocations people, a study of manpowe quirements, and efforts to re-es-tablish industrial production as well as governmental functions.

It was estimated that food sup-plies would have been sufficient for ten days. However many prob-lems could have arisen as to the proper distribution of food after the ten day period.

It was felt by the County and Alternate Directors that this test was successful although primarily so in that it showed the extremely arise and the shortcomings of pre-paredness.

It was obvious from the actions and the results that there is a shortage of trained Civil Defense personnel, a definite lack on the part of the individual citizen and business of knowledge of what could happen and what to do. Let appears that your County Civil Defense organization har
