Charles Lewis, R.D. 3, Greenwood, New York, has announced his candidacy for member of the Board of Education of the Greenwood Central School to replace Wayne Warriner. Warriner's term expires June 30 and he has announced that he will not seek reelection after 12 years on the Board.

Mr. and Mrs. Lewis have two children, both attending the Greenwood School.

Diane Woodward, senior of Greenwood Central School, will enter State University Agriculture and Technical Institute for a two year course in Medical Laboratory Technology, according to Myron Phillips, Guidance Director.

She has been an honor student and participated in extra curriculum activities including: Band, 4 years; Chorus, 4 years; All-County Chorus; editor of yearbook; Varsity cheerleader, captain, senior year; girl's athletic association; nurses' aide; girl's ensemble; and National Honor Society.

At an extra meeting of the Board of Education of the Greenwood Central School early last week, Mrs. Marjorie Matthews, Clerk to the Board, submitted a resignation effective July 1, 1964.

The resignation will terminate almost twenty years of consecutive service to the school district. She has served as Treasurer; office secretary, a position later combined with District Clerk. Since 1959 she has served in the capacity of District Clerk solely.

Shirley Cook, teacher of Homemaking, was present to present a report on the work of the Future Homemaking on the local, county, and state level. Her report included the work of the girls who had been elected to a regional or

state office. The Principal reported on changes in the staff for the coming year. The Board accepted with regret the resignation of Mrs. Marian Hussey and Maurice Folts. Mrs. Hussey has served the school since September 1958, teaching Latin and French and doing part time work in the library.

Folts has been Director of Physical Education and Coach of Varsity athletics for the past two years. His teams have averaged about the 50% mark with the last basketball team qualifying for sectional playoffs. Also leaving the system will be Mrs. Flora Crawford, teacher of remedial work. Full time remedial work will be dropped for next year and the service obtained on a shared service basis through teacher hired by the Steuben County Board of Cooperative Educational Services.

Myron Phillips, Director of Guidance, has announced that he plans to submit his resignation to the BOCES Board through which his services are engaged.

Upon recommendation of the Principal and the District Superintendent, Mrs. Margaret Fehl, teacher of Social Studies, and James DeMarte, teacher of English were placed on tenure effective September 1, having satisfactorily completed a three year probationary term.
