253 Persons Attend Alumni Banquet

A record 253 persons attended the A. C. S. Alumni Banquet, Saturday, May 30 in the school cafeteria. A delicious roast turkey dinner was served at 7 p. m. by the Class of 1965.

Richard Lynch, Class of 1949, was a most capable toastmaster. Rev. Willis V. Poole gave the invocation and benediction.

In the absence of the Alumni President, Paul Kilbane, Class of 1944, welcomed the group to the school and the Class of 1964 as new members of the Association. He gave a special salute to Miss Ruth Baker, retiring fourth grade teacher at Andover-Central School.

Principal James H. Kessler addressed his remarks especially to the graduating class, citing them for their success during their school years. He also stated that education was necessary and was a privilege of American citizenship, that the group would be successful even though some were "lazy" and that their future earnings are directly related to the education they receive. The danger of the future, he continued, was lack of appreciation for America. America can only be destroyed from within. Youth must accept the responsibilities of American citizenship. In closing he reminded the group that like the writers of the Declaration of Independence youth must be ready to pledge fortunes and lives for freedom.

Mrs. Charity McCormick read letters from J. Donald Oakes, Sadie Cleveland Shanahan, Bethel Millspaugh Hatch, Anna Farley Smith, Ruth M. Robinson, Warren Palmer, Violet Barney Leonard, George Wheeler, Maxine Crandall Remaly, D. L. Baker, Dr. Ben Crandall and William C. Cannon. During Roll Call of the Classes special recognition was given to Fay Boyd, Class of 1914 celebrating his 50th reunion. Mr. Boyd also spoke for his class. George Karcanes was spokesman for the Class of '44 (20th) and Louis Fulkerson did the honors for the Class of '39 (25th). Representing the Class of 1944 were Paul Kilbane, Francis Horan, George Kozares, Kenneth William Barnard Burger and Marilyn Hardy.

Dr. Farnum Pope, a member of the Class of 1937 gave the Address. He recalled his first Alumni Banquet and the changes in subsequent years. He addressed his remarks to the Class of 1964 saying that the future of our young adults is greater than ever, that they will out perform their parents, that they are healthier and have a greater capacity for learning, that their life span will be longer and that they will have greater wisdom. Never, he stressed, has a group had such a background and such potential. It is an exciting time, a challenging time. The decision of what to do is harder than ever to make.

He also noted that pleasures and responsibilities come from living in the United States. Our freedoms have been reaped from self-government. We must accomplish to the same degree in social and political areas what we have achieved through advances in science and other areas.

Dr. Pope continued by saying we need people who dare to face reality and who will be driven to find pathways of social control. Statesmanship is needed in human and political affairs. Contributions plus sacrifices for the benefit of all mankind are necessary.

He concluded by saying we are a great nation, our children have great potential. We are in a world leadership role. We must have faith that our challenge will be met by like-minded individuals in other nations. We must create an international way to walk and work together. This is an exciting time to choose a career—the guide to your success will be "do unto others as you would have them do unto you."
