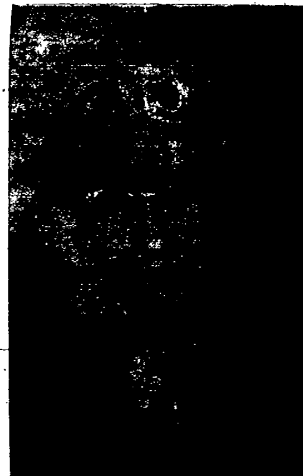

Mrs. Helmer has been a member of the Andover Central faculty for nineteen years. She is best remembered by her students for teaching, first, the double third and fourth grade room and for the past five years, the fourth grade.

While talking with Mrs. Helmer, I asked if she felt that children had changed any through the years. She replied, "Children

have changed a great deal. Discipline has become much more difficult." She feels that the main reason for this change is that their great number of other interests take their minds from their work. No special event in her teaching career stands out in her mind. We feel that this means that each day, every year was of equal importance to her.
