On Sunday, the Perry Raceway presented their Annual Mid-Season Championship, 100 Lap Feature for the Moderns for an overflowing crowd of excited spectators.

This year "Dick" Flaig drove his own No. 33, to a well earned victory despite having the bad luck of spinning out once and losing a little of his precious lead.

Takes Georgia Job

Clyde D. Robbins, Cattaraugus County planning director for the past two years, has announced he would resign, effective July 24.

Mr. Robbins made his surprise announcement in a letter read at a special executive session of the board in little Valley.

The county's first planning director, Mr. Robbins is credited with doing an outstanding job in stimulating a move toward zoning and protection of the county's natural advantages.

Mr. Robbins leaves the county for a dual post at Georgia Institute of Technology. His salary will be \$13,000 to act as director of campus planning and teach as associate professor of city planning.

Mr. Robbins is the son of the late Claude Robbins and Mrs. Ema Robbins of Wellsville and a nephew of Mrs. Richard Ordway of Andover.

He started in Cattaraugus County April 1, 1962 at \$10,000 and was raised to \$10,500 this year.

Mr. Robbins has "run the gamut" of experience, having been associated with commercial planning firms, county government, and now the educational field, which is new to him. Campus planning, he said is also new to Georgia Tech. The city of Atlanta is in the throes of an extensive urban renewal program in which the school is involved.

Board Chairman Hughson Case said Mr. Robbins resigned with an expression of appreciation to those supervisors "who have recognized the importance of planning to Cattaraugus County and who supported me in the position".

The director said he will miss the pleasanter aspects of the county but feels a personal obligation to move upward as the opportunity is presented. A board vote of 39 to 5 set up the depart-

ment and a small nucleus of objectors has dragged its heels on planning.

Leighton T. Wade, chairman of the county planning board, said "the director will be extremely difficult to replace with a man of like ability, energy and job loyalty". He led the four-month search for the county's first director in late 1961 and early 1962.

Mr. Wade noted that Mr. Robbins has helped 18 towns and seven villages in local planning. Of this number, most have adopted zoning codes and the rest are in the process of doing so. In addition, Mr. Robbins has been active in protecting the county's interests in regard to planning of recreational facilities in connection with the Kinzua Dam project.

He has carried out numerous assignments by the board of supervisors, assisted with planning in connection with two mall watershed projects and given advice when asked concerning a number
