Wolf Creek Boy Scout Camp Receives A Rating

The Wolf Creek Boy Scout Camp has this year, for the first time in its 17-year history, received the coveted "A" Rating.

Awarded after a stiff examination of both facilities and camping program, the rating signifies a better than 90 per cent attainment in a long list of requirements. It was presented this week by the Camp Committee of the Seneca Council, Boy Scouts of America, and Melvin B. Neisner, Rochester, representing the National Council.

Thomas Busack Olean, Council camping chairman, led the delegation of eight men from the Council Camping and Activities Committee who accompanied Mr. Neisner on his three-hour tour of inspection. Mr. Busack announced the "A" rating.

In previous years the camp had almost attained this achievement but the top rating was previously denied because of minor deficiencies.

The 350-acre camp is located about six miles north of Portville. While it has a number of buildings, emphasis is placed on outdoor activities, such as swimming, scoutercraft, field sports, cooking, nature and setting up camps at "buckskin sites."

Wolf Creek opened a four-week season July 5 and anticipates enrollment of about 400 boys during the season, an increase over last year, from throughout Cattaraugus and Allegany counties, which comprise the Seneca Council.

Two district executives, A. Robert Maurice, Salamanca, and Leonard Pazda, Wellsville, head the camp staff of 17. Mr. Maurice is camp director and Mr. Pazda is business manager.

The proposed budget of \$420,113.66 with a tax levy of \$82,008 and the purchase of a school bus were approved by the voters of Andover on Tuesday evening at the annual meeting held in the school. The budget was passed by a 71-7 vote and the school bus proposal was passed by a 74-1 vote.

Carl Burdick, a board veteran, won over Greta Green by a vote of 67-17. Walter Gath, unopposed, was elected by 84 votes to a position on the board which he has been holding by an appointment. He will serve three years remaining on the term of Cleon Clarke who resigned to assume the supervisor's job in the Town of Independence.
