Greenwood Central School News

The meeting last week in a special meeting the Board of Education, of Greenwood Central School gave final review to the budget for 1964-65 school year and approved same for presentation at the annual meeting July 14. The budget of \$216,288.21 will require only about \$3,000 more in taxes even though the increased budget is approximately \$16,000 above 1963-64. The increases are due mainly to normal salary increments, persistently rising prices increase need for maintenance establishment of a special class program.

There was discussion on an appointment of a tax collector but the matter was tabled until the meeting of July 21 when the new Board will meet a week after the annual election.

A request from the Teacher's Association for additional coverage under sick leave was reviewed. The Teachers had asked that for definite stated reasons of urgent and personal needs that two days per year be allowed upon request and reviewed by the Board. No additional days are to be added to the basic allotment. The Board voted to inaugurate a new provision. Both teaching and non-teaching employees eligible for sick leave will be affected.

The Principal was authorized to negotiate a contract with Charles Lewis for masonry work on the tower and front light columns of the school for the resetting of coping stones and repointing of joints.

On recommendation of Robert Hoagland, Agriculture teacher, Francis Meehan of Rexville was reappointed to the Agricultural Advisory Board for a term of five years.

In other items of business the Board gave authorization to the new clerk, Virginia Hunt, to attend a conference and workshop for School Board Clerks in Syracuse, August 9-12.

It was voted to dispense with the regularly scheduled meeting for July 13 and will include the business of that meeting with the re-organizational meeting on July 21.

Two former teachers in the Greenwood Central School will be back with the friends in the local system when school opens in September. Mr. and Mrs. Jay Bangs, presently residing in Herkimer have both been engaged by the Steuben County Board of Co-operative Educational Services according to a recent announcement by George Daulton, District Superintendent of Schools.

Bangs who will serve the Greenwood and Addison schools in the Guidance Department was a teacher of Commercial subjects in the Greenwood school during the last school year. He left Greenwood to continue the same work in the Little Falls Public High Schools.

Mrs. Penelope Cole Bangs formerly served the Cooperative Board as a Dental Hygienist. She will return in the same capacity after a year in the Herkimer Public Schools. Troupsburg, Jasper, Woodhull, Greenwood and Ark-
