This Saturday at 2 P. M., Andover will meet a strong Almond team at the Almond Diamond. Come and support the team.

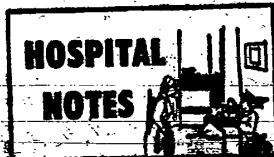
Andover Agent Honored By New York 65

News That's Print To Fit

Boy! The old "Dog-Days" were really with us for the last part of this week weren't they? In fact Tuesday was about the hottest day we can remember in this neck of the woods for a long, long time.

According to a report from Wellsville, the mercury hit a new high of 102 on Tuesday afternoon with high humidity and a falling barometer making it that much worse.

We checked with the boys down at the Andover Pump Station and found that the 26th showed a high of 86; the 27th—92; and the 28th had a record high of 95; with yesterday's high at 84 and a low of 49 early this A. M. In fact, the boys checked through all of the records that were available and found that 95 degrees was the hottest in the past few years, at least in this locality. Anyway, since yesterday afternoon's showers, we aren't having to resort to shorts and scanty attire, so the local wags will have to find a new target for their humor.

Along with summer vacations, hot weather, and lots of people taking trips, comes a timely warning from the FBI about the dangers of picking up hitch-hikers.

According to J. Edgar Hoover, director of the FBI: "Offering a ride to a stranger, like passing on a hill or a curve, is a dangerous, blind gamble. In neither case can the motorists foresee what is ahead."

Many of us hate to pass up an apparent serviceman in uniform, but, according to a report from the New Jersey State Troopers after checking turnpike hitchhikers: they discovered 162 runaways, 98 servicemen AWOL, (absent without leave), seven inmates fleeing mental hospitals, and five escaped convicts. The fingerprints of 500 others were on criminal records.

In another report—out of 100 hitchhikers passing thru a small Arizona town, lawmen discovered that 84 had criminal records and 12 others were either juvenile runaways or AWOL servicemen. Only 4 were without police records.

Still think that you can pick out a reputable and harmless hitchhiker? Then think about this: A hitchhiker may sue the driver in the event of an accident since over 20 states have laws that state that an auto owner is liable to his "guest" in case of injury through "ordinary negligence."

In fact we can remember someone in the local area that made a statement to a friend of ours with whom he was riding to work that "if he should get hurt he wouldn't hesitate a minute to sue the driver." Needless to say, that was the last free ride he received from that driver!

Thus, unless you see someone you recognize along the highway that is looking for a ride, its better to be safe than sorry!

Another Tip to Drivers: — If you drive without carrying your driver license and vehicle registration with you, you are at least inviting annoyance and delay to yourself. Motor Vehicle Commissioner William S. Hulst said today.

In recent weeks, the Commissioner said, many inquiries have come to him about the law's requirements in this area. Many motorists, he explained, are of the mistaken impression that they have 24 or 48 hours to produce a license or registration.

Here is what the law requires: — Upon request of a policeman, a motorist is required to show his driver license and vehicle registration certificate.

—If he is unable to do so, this is considered "prima facie" evidence that the driver is not licensed, or the vehicle is not registered, and he may be faced with a summons or even an arrest.
