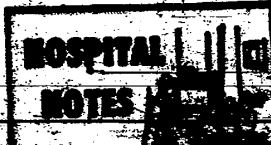

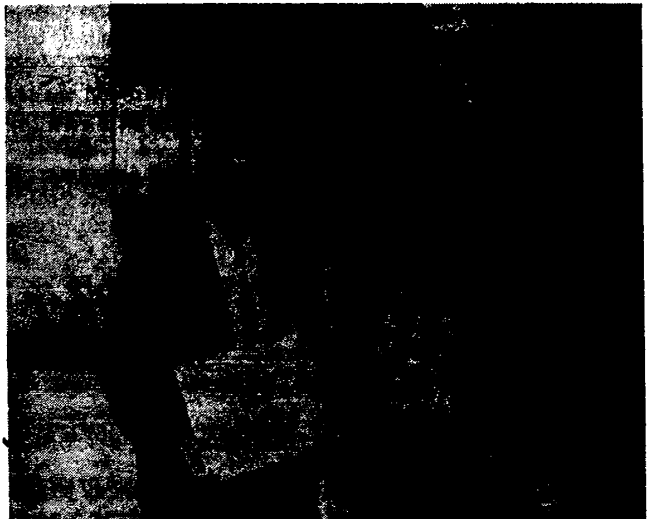
All of the players that played in the Sunday game which was the finale of the season, were given a small trophy presented by the President of the "All-Star" Little League Committee.

## Renew Chauffeur License Before August 31st

Chauffeur license applications are now on their way to some 150,000 drivers whose licenses are up for renewal before August 31. Among the 150,000 are the first 50,000 who will be undergoing the State's new driver vision re-testing program.

Those who must submit to the vision exam have last names beginning with the letters A through F.

Mailing of the pre-printed punch card license application was made Friday from Albany. Those eligible for renewal must complete the transaction by August 31 through their local Motor Vehicle issuing office.

The 100,000 with last initials G through Z will renew in the regular way, either by mail or by personal visit. They need only complete the pre-printed application and submit it together with the renewal or record of conviction stamp from their current license, and the regular \$6 fee.

The other 50,000 must, do the same and, in addition, must prove they can meet the State's minimum vision standards. They may do this by taking the eye test in a Motor Vehicle issuing office, by submitting a certificate from a physician, ophthalmologist, oculist, or optometrist.

The State's standards are 20-40 in either or both eyes, with or without corrective lenses. These are the same standards that apply to new drivers.
