State Of New York Executive Chamber Albany

Governor Rockefeller, by word and action in the course of rioting and looting in Rochester, emphasized this week his determination that "the people of this state and the people of all the local communities of the state must and will be protected from mob violence."

At the request of local officials in both instances, the Governor sent State Police into Rochester to aid municipal police and subsequently activated several units of the National Guard for stand-by duty in readiness to lend assistance if needed.

The Governor toured areas of Rochester on Monday, later expressing "shock and great sadness" at what he had observed.

"As Governor and as a citizen," he said, "I deplore this kind of violence. Regardless of the objectives, it cannot be justified."

Governor Rockefeller's pledge of protection for the people against mob violence came in a statement he issued after the Friday night of Rochester rioting.

"The police forces of our state are our principal bulwark against mob violence and chaos," the Governor said. "They must have citizen support everywhere in these efforts."

"Minority groups have the most to gain from the maintenance of law and order. New York State has the most complete and effective

"As Governor of the State of New York, I shall use every legal means at my command to see that order is maintained, and that we continue to make progress in the vital areas of human concern—not under the duress of violence or threats of violence, but through the regular processes of government."
