



**Victoria Lynch Delegate To Youth Program**

Victoria Lynch 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lynch was among the 1,000 delegates from 44 states, and several provinces of Canada who attended the American Institute of Cooperatives at Michigan State University at East Lansing, Mich., Sunday through Wednesday.

Victoria represented District Three of the Metropolitan Milk Producers Cooperative Bargaining Agency at the Institute.

Delegates represented 14 youth and cooperative groups. The Agency sent 10 delegates.

Miss Lynch was chosen on the basis of the activity record she entered and an essay she wrote on "The Value of Cooperatives to My Home and My Community" and "Why I Want To Be Selected as a Youth Delegate."

Victoria was salutatorian of the Andover Central School graduating class. She was editor of the school paper, The Hi Herald, and active in the school chapter of Future Homemakers of America. She is a long 4-H member and has entered her horse and pony projects in the Allegany County Fair. She is also lecturer of the Andover Grange.

She will enter the State Agricultural and Technical Institute at Alfred this fall where she will be enrolled in the Data Processing Course.

In her essay she wrote, "In today's modern society, the farmer without a cooperative is like Ford Motor Co., without a customer. A lone farmer finds it impossible to market his product—this (the role of cooperatives) could be compared to unions that bargain for wages cooperatively."

In preparation for her trip she was given several reading assignments. She took a Farm Co-op quiz at the Institute and received a certificate based on her score.

On her return Miss Lynch will be asked to give talks at local co-op meetings and at other farm groups. This is the first year the Agency has sent delegates and it is hoped that the group will form the nucleus of a youth organization.

**J. Archie Diffin**

J. Archie Diffin, 69, of Mesa, Arizona, died Saturday, August 1, 1964 at the Mesa Southside District Hospital.

He was born in Andover, the son of John and Minnie Diffin, and received his bachelor's degree from Colgate University, and a master's degree from Stanford University.

Mr. Diffin came to Arizona in 1921 and taught at Peoria, Superior and Bisbee before moving to Florence in 1931. He retired in 1950 after having been superintendent of schools at Superior for 10 years.

He was the first president and a lifetime member of the Arizona Game Protection Association. He also belonged to the Wilderness Society. He was a veteran of World War I and a member of the American Legion.

His wife, Alice, a daughter, Mrs. Dorabel Daley of Casa Grande; and two grandsons survive.

Funeral services were held Tuesday in the Florence Presbyterian Church with the Rev. Richard Archibald of the Casa Grande Presbyterian Church officiating.

**David Howe Library To Hold Annual Art Show**

The Wellsville Art Association, David A. Howe Public Library of Wellsville, N. Y., is planning the Third Annual Art Show which will be held in the Exhibition Room of The David A. Howe Public Library. **Christmas Tree Session Set For Cornell**

The Christmas tree of the future is the theme of the third National Christmas Tree Growers' Convention to be held at Cornell University, August 20-22. Several hundred growers and their families are expected to attend.

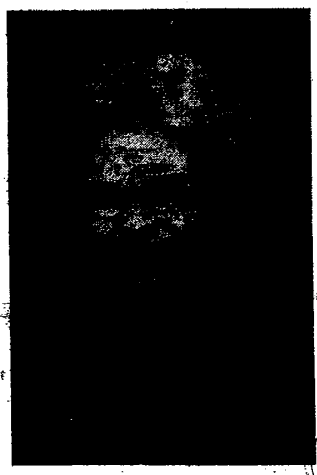
Speakers from Canada and the United States will discuss future changes in Christmas tree growing made necessary by modern housing design and land use. They will cite recent figures indicating Christmas tree production has a retail value of \$96,698,800 with the good, marketable trees no longer grown on land too poor for other crops.

The 11 topics on the program include "Better Trees in the Future Through Breeding, Seed Selection, and Seed Source Control"; "Balsam Fir Management"; "The Future Role of Christmas Trees in Land Use"; "Research and Needs in Christmas Tree Production"; "The Christmas Tree in Housing of the Future"; and "Credit and Marketing".

William W. Serra of Belmont, N. Y., National President and Chairman, will open the three day meeting, and Dean C. E. Palm, N. Y., State College of Agriculture, will give the address of welcome.

In addition to the lectures, some 40 exhibits of equipment and supplies will be on display in Barton Hall.

**State-wide Motor Boats Registration Check**

A state-wide check of New York State motor boats to determine the extent of compliance with registration requirements of the Navigation Law will begin, Friday, August 14, 1964, Conservation Commissioner Harold G. Wilm has announced.

The Commissioner said that from August 14 - 21 has been set aside for the special check of pleasure craft registration on all state waters, both inland and tidal, by county navigation patrols.

James J. O'Brien, director of the Division of Motor Boats, asked the full cooperation of all county enforcement agencies in the mass registration check in a letter sent to these agencies earlier this week.

"We are urgently in need of statistical data which can only be procured from a concerted effort during this period", he said.

Data forwarded to the Division of Motor Boats, following the check, will be used to determine whether revamped enforcement measures are necessary. Information gathered will consist of a numerical count of vessels operating without a current valid registration certificate.

Procedures to be used have been left in the hands of local enforcement personnel but the Division has urged that "water blocks" similar to road blocks, be set up at critical points along the state's waterways during the period.

Violation of Section 71 of the Navigation Law dealing with registration constitutes an offense and is punishable by a fine not exceeding \$50.
