\$9.5 Million Highway Bid Opening Sept. 10th

J. Burch McMorran, State Superintendent of Public Works, has announced that sealed bids will be opened on September 10, 1964 for 16 highway projects with an estimated total cost of \$9,573,000.

The highway work involves construction, reconstruction or other improvements along approximately 23 miles of roads in 14 counties.

Bids will be opened publicly at 10:30 a. m. in the hearing room of the DPW Administration and Engineering Building at the State Office Building Campus, Albany. Locations, descriptions and estimated costs of the projects follow:

ALLEGANY COUNTY — Reconstruction of Route 305 from Water Street in Cuba northerly 1.34 miles to north of the Erie-Lackawanna Railroad underpass. The project, involving relocation of the highway slightly to the east from Maple Street to its north end calls for replacing the underpass with a new three-span composite I-beam bridge, 266 feet long, over the tracks. The highway will be rebuilt with a new 24-foot-wide cement concrete pavement, flanked by two parking lanes and curbs between Water Street and Tannery Creek. Also included is construction of a new twin-box bridge 51 feet long, at Oil Creek. Estimated at \$994,000.

ALLEGANY & STEUBEN CO. Resurfacing of Route 21 from just west of the Allegany County line in Almond easterly 3.54 miles to the bridge over Canacadea Creek about a half-mile east of the west city line of Hornell. The 24-foot and variable width pavement will be resurfaced with asphalt-concrete, new curbing built at Almond and Thacherville, a new storm sewer installed in

Thacherville and drainage structures improved at Almond. Estimated at \$237,000. (This project originally was included in the highway bid opening of July 23, 1964, when no bids were received for it. Originally estimated at \$193,000.)
