LIVING UNDER LAW

CRIMINAL AND CIVIL-LAW

When two tars crash, for instance, two kinds of law may sometimes come into play. One if criminal and the other civil

Under criminal law, the district attorney or the judge looks into the accident and may decide that

one or both parties broke a

traffic law.

It must be proved beyond all reasonable doubt that one all reasonable doubt that one or both drivers broke a certain law. It is no defense for you that the other driver also broke the law. If the court finds that the proceeder did not prove the arims beyond a reasonable doubt then the state will jose its case. The secured negligence is is no desense to a criminal action.

Civil Action Explained

that may grow out of an acci-dent, for example, is a civil action. Anyone burt in the crash may sue the driver or owner of the other car asking

for money damages. In a civil for money damages. In a civil action you have merely to show by a "preponderance" of the evidence, that the other party caused the accident. You as "plaintiff" do not have to prove your ease beyond all reasonable doubt.

Moreover, in a civil case, mike the triminal case, "ton-tributory negligence" is a good defense. Let the "dafandant" show that the plaintiff's own



negligent acts helped to cause the socialist and the "plaintiff" will less his case. So a person can be held criminally liable, and yet de-feat a civil suit where the defense of confributory negli-gence is available to him. Or, one may be held liable in a civil action and yet found not guilty in a criminal action
