Baker's Hardware was founded
Janary 15, 1997 by Erwin D.
and Arling R. Baker, under the
name of Baker Brothers. The
original retail firm located on
Main Street presently occupied by.
Fuller's Restaurant and the Dinot, Fuller's Restaurant and the Dinet, was actually a country store for it handled a wide variety of merchandise; Hardware, buggys, and wagons, paint, harnesses and harness supplies, farm machinery and plumbing supplies.

As business and conditions

As business and conditions changed, the firm during the years dropped such items as wagyears dropped such thems as wag-ons, farm machinery, etc., and added housewares, toys, floor cov-grings, farm and garden seeds, fertilizers, wall paper and small electrical appliances.

In the summer of 1925 the business moved to its present location on Greenwood Street. In 1933, upon the represent to Erwin D. Bakers, the name was changed to Bakers Hardware and was owned and constitution. owned and operated by Arling Baker.

During the 54-years of contin-ous business, several men were as-sociated with the firm: John Christian, Fay Boyd, who owned an interest in the business from 1920-1925; Earl Rowland, Bert Sharp, Archie Youmans, William Enos, Claude Eldredge, John Wahl, Thomas Bassett and Almon Wood, who owned an interest from 1939 to 1951. Upon the death of Arling Baker in 1950, death of Aring Baker in 1950, the business continued operation under the ownership of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Harder and Mr. and Mrs. Almond Wood. In 1951, Mr. and Mrs. Wood sold their interest in the business to Mr. and Mrs. Harder who have since owned and operated the store. operated the store.
