Bill Layfield Takes B-Modified Championship Race At Sportsman's Raceway

On Saturday evening Sept. 5th, two parachute jumps were presented by "The Canyon Skydivers" of Wellsboro about 7:40 p. m. Two other men were supposed to jump but due to wind disorders it was necessary to postpone their jumps until Sunday evening. They made an attempt to land in the middle of the track but landed just outside of the track both nights.

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Many accidents occurred on both nights but none had bodily injuries. To mention one, Bob Loring, Andover, took a "nose dive" during the novice consolation race. Bob was driving for a while when suddenly his car was standing straight up on its front bumper and it stood in that position for nearly six seconds.

For the novice stock feature Ike Edminter, Elmira, came first with Wash Layfield, Allentown, took second position and Bob Williams, Woodhull, third.

Al Plank, Westfield, won the modern feature with Ray Kent taking second and Ken Gee placing third.

In the B-Modified Championship Race Bill Layfield of Allentown sped to an early lead with Don Kio, Ulysses, running second. With only ten laps to go Don rolled his car and was unable to finish the race. Lyle Cornelius, then took second and Gabe Hanes third. Bill Layfield was presented with a trophy immediately after winning the race. The championship trophies this year are donated by Goodyear Hose Co., of Galeton, Pa.

On Sunday, Sept. 6th, Sportsman's Raceway held its annual Dean Layfield Memorial Race. The Rev. Allegany Co. Technical Action Panel Members Visit Hector Project

Charles Hebblethwaite, County Agent, Rodney Sheffield, ASCS Manager, John Clark, Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor, Leslie Whitney, Soil Conservation Service, Work Unit Conservationist visited the Hector Grazing Project on Wednesday, August 26th.

The project is operated under a cooperative Grazing Association. Here young cattle, beef cows and calves, sheep and horses are grazed on a full season basis for a predetermined fee.

We, in Allegany County, have many acres of land suitable for pasture. Could it be of interest to landowners and dairymen to set up a co-operative grazing system to make good use of land which may in the future be retired from farming?

As the dairy enterprises become more intensified and larger numbers of replacement are needed, will we have pasture land available at home for our growing replacements?

Anyone interested in such a project should contact any of the above persons.

A watershed study is in progress in Allegany County. The Genesee River Basin Study which in time may become a working watershed program.

The results of this study may provide this county with some excellent planning information to meet the water needs for recreation, irrigation and flood control. We must understand that all of these may be very important to the future progress and economy of our county.

August Rainfall

According to the Soil Conservation Service technicians at Belmont the rainfall in Belmont was 4.49 inches during August. This is 2 inches more than rainfall received during August of 1963 and one of the highest rainfall figures for August since 1947. The highest rainfall on record was 5.36 inches in the year 1956.

This high rainfall should add greatly to damage of corn stage in most areas of Allegany County.

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
