The project is operated under a cooperative Grazing Association. Here young cattle, beef cows and calves, sheep and horses are grazed on a full season basis for a pretermined fee.

We, in Allegany County, have many acres of land suitable for pasture. Could it be of interest to landowners and dairymen to set up a co-operative grazing system to make good use of land which may in the future be retired from farming?
