Governor Rockefeller has proclaimed September 19 as "American Indian Day" and declared these first inhabitants of New York State to be "among our most valued and valuable fellow citizens."
 "In every war for freedom that has been forced upon us they have fought with outstanding valor and skill," the Governor said. "Their peace time activities have also earned them unanimous respect and good will. They, for their part, have manifested a fully developed sense of their duties and responsibilities as citizens. They occupy a warm place in our affections."
 American Indian Day this year is dedicated to Mary Jemison, famed in history as the white woman of the Genesee, who was taken captive at 16 near Marsh Creek, Pennsylvania, and grew up among Indians of the Seneca Nation. Indians plan a pilgrimage of Mary Jemison descendants to the Letchworth State Park monument which honors her.
