

Big Game Gunning Season Announced

A total of 48,000 party permits to take a bonus deer-of-either-sex have been allotted for the 1964 big game gunning season, the State Conservation Department has announced.

The basic gunning season for both deer and black bear will run Oct. 25 - Dec. 1 in the Adirondack and Northern Zone counties and Nov. 16 - Dec. 1 in the rest of the State where it is legal to shoot big game.

A party permit enables a party of four licensed hunters to take one deer, with or without antlers, in addition to any deer legally allowed individual members of the party. Permit quotas and area boundaries are based upon an analysis of the 1963 buck harvest and extensive field surveys of deer population levels and range conditions.

Last year, a total of 63,874 whitetail deer was killed by big game hunters including 25,327 bonus deer under the party permit system. Approximately 95 per cent of the 47,800 permits available were issued.

Assistant commissioner for fish and game, Dr. E. L. Cheatum, aid party permit application forms will be available at local license-issuing agents and Conservation Department offices by mid-September. Applications cannot be postmarked earlier than Sept. 23 or later than Oct. 16.

Quotas and permit areas for the 1964 season will be:

- 3300 for Area A — comprising portions of Chautauq, Essex and Franklin Counties;
- 5500 for Area B — comprising all of Hamilton and portions of Essex, Herkimer, Saratoga and Warren Counties;
- 3500 for Area C — comprising a portion of St. Lawrence County;
- 5000 for Area D — comprising portions of Broome, Chenango, Greene, Delaware, Otsego, Schoharie and Ulster Counties;
- 5250 for Area E — comprising portions of Sullivan, Ulster, Orange and Delaware Counties;
- 14,700 for Area F — comprising all of Steuben, Schuyler, Tompkins, Chemung, Tioga and portions of Broome and Chenango Counties;
- 6700 for Area G — comprising all of Chautauq, Cattaraugus and Allegany Counties;
- 4400 for Area H — comprising all of Livingston and Yates and portions of Ontario, Oneida, Genesee and Wyoming Counties;
- 1650 for Area I — comprising all of Erie, Niagara, Orleans, Wayne and portions of Ontario, Monroe, Genesee and Wyoming Counties;

For the most part, area boundaries follow numbered State and local highways or prominent natural landmarks to help hunters refine permit areas in the field. Other provisions of the big game season, except dates, are basically the same as 1963.

Hunting time, including opening day in 7 a. m., to 5 p. m., (prevaling time.) No Sunday hunting is permitted in the central and western portions of the State except for hunting with long bow during the special archery season.

Holders of the special archery license can go afield 14 days prior to the opening of the gunning season and may take a deer-of-either-sex and one bear. Starting dates for archers are Oct. 11 in the Northern Zone and Nov. 2 in the Southern Zone except Westchester County which is limited to long bow hunting only from Nov. 1 - Dec. 31.

Women can continue to use their special archery license during the regular gunning season but deer taken then must have three inch antlers. Except for the party permit, a person may take only one deer and one bear during the entire season.

CALLING ALL DEER HUNTERS! Calling all Deer Hunters! According to Mrs. Pelton, Andover Town Clerk, Applications for Party Permits and Big-Game Hunting Licenses came in last week—but too late for us to take note of it in the paper.

The News Release from the Conservation Department appears in this week's paper (we hope), but at any rate for all our local readers that are interested in Party Permits we want to call this to their attention.

Applications for Party Permits cannot be postmarked earlier than Sept. 23 or later than Oct. 16th. If things go according to previous years, unless your permit is in the mail as early as the first few opening days—you might as well save your money, time and trouble!

According to Assistant Commissioner for fish and game, Dr. E. L. Cheatum, Party Permit application forms would be available at local license-issuing agents and Conservation Department offices by mid-September.

Wild Turkey Hunting Dates Set

Special hunting dates for New York's once-extinct wild turkey were announced today by the State Conservation Department.

In Western New York where the State's largest and earliest game bird was returned to huntable status six years ago, the open season will run October 19 - 24 in Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauq and Steuben Counties.

Eastern New York gunners will have a crack at the wild turkey from October 5 - 7 in Delaware County where 600 permits will be issued on a first-come, first served basis.

General hunting regulations follow the same pattern as 1963 with a one bird per hunter bag limit. Gunning hours for both sections are from 7 a. m. to 5 p. m., prevailing time of the State. Hunters may use only shotguns loaded with No. 2, 4.5 or 6 shot.
