Governor Rockefeller has pro-claimed October 5-12 as "Fire Pre-vention Week" to help focus at tention on a cause of life and "one of the most serious and most tragic problems of modern life". "No fewer than 11,800 persons in the United States lost their

in the United States lost their lives in 1963 as a result of fire", he said. "The total in property loss during the same year was 1,405,558,000.

"Long experience has proved that while fire prevention can be effectively practiced by active cooperation between public, governmentes and industrist agencies; uttinate responsibility must rest with
the individual who by his care
could prevent most destructive
fires.".

Emphasizing that carelessness

Emphasizing that carelessness Emphasizing that carciessiess "is the leading cause of fire loss", the Governor added:

"This may take the form of heedlessly discarded cigarettes, im-properly doused fires, storage of

properly doused fires, storage of combustible waste, defective elec-trical appliances. All of these can be eliminated if people become safety-minded.'

He urged all people "to make active effort to curb the tragic loss from fire" and all local governments, Chamber of Commerce, business; labor and farm organizations, as well as schools, civic groups, and public information agencies "to share actively in charting Fire Prevention Week".

Storage Shed **Burns At** Clark Farm

A combined storage shed and chicken coop burned to the ground late Wednesday afternoon at the Newton Clark farm on the Fulmer Valley Road about 2 miles off the Trapping Brook Rd. However, Firemen were able to keep the fire from spreading to another storage shed in back as well as the near-by barn and home. A metal garage that was adjoining the burning building was partially damaged, but not beyond repair.

The Andover Fire Department responded to the alarm and were on the scene of the fire first, with their tanker and new pumper to-gether with around 10 local fire-men.

Before the water supply from the Andover Tanker was exhausted, the McEwen Hose Co., of Wellsville appeared on the scene with their new pumper accompan-ied by the Town of Wellsville

with their new pumper accompanied by the Town of Wellsville Tanker as well as around 35 Wellsville Firemen.

Since there was no farm pond in the immediate vicinity, the two tankers well proved their worth furnishing an ample water supply which undoubtedly helped a long ways in preventing the fire from spreading to the other farm buildings nearby.

The fire was apparently caused when escaping gas inside the building exploded, as repairs were being made on the gas line outside, several feet away from the building itself.
