Here are a few of the worthwhile duties the local Red Cross performs.

2. Disaster Service. In time of flood or fire the Red Cross provides homes, clothing, and food for victims. It also helps the family find a new home and possessions and gives news of families to anxious relatives.

3. Red Cross Gray Ladies work in veterans' hospitals and the Red Cross helps area servicemen and their families.

4. Water Safety. The Red Cross conducts classes in water safety and gives instruction in swimming. This instruction has undoubtedly saved many lives.

5. Instruction in home nursing and first aid. The Red Cross gives free instruction in both of these necessary fields.

No one really appreciates what the Red Cross does until trouble or disaster strikes. Then people find that it is like insurance. When needed, the Red Cross is there only if they have paid their premiums for it. So why not pay "your premium"?

### Fire Prevention And You

Sunday, October 4, will mark the beginning of Fire Prevention Week across the nation. This is the time when everyone should inspect his home to make sure it is completely fire safe.

In a fire safe home, there are two important factors to be considered:

1. Good family habits about fire and its dangers; 2. Good construction.

Included under good family habits are such things as care with matches and smoking, good house-keeping to get rid of rubbish, proper use of electrical fuses, appliances, and extension cords, and a constant general awareness of the ways fires start and how to avoid them.

Good construction for a fire safe home includes: 1. built-in fire stops in the walls; 2. solid doors in every room; 3. good escape routes; 4. interior finish of materials with low flame-spread characteristics; 5. fire-resistant roofing material; 6. proper wiring and 7. a good heating plans properly installed and located, regularly inspected and cleaned.

It is the duty of every citizen to make sure that his home is completely free of any fire hazards—not only during Fire Prevention Week, but during every day of every year.
