### Social Security News

If you are over 65 and still working, you should consult your nearest social security office.

Have you read or heard the above advice before but then failed to follow up on it? If so, this

ed to follow up on it. 130, the article is for you.

Most people know that in order to collect social security benefits for each morth in the year, they must limit their carnings to \$1200 for that year,

for that year.

What many people do not seem

to realize is that even if one is
over 65 and still earning more
that \$1206 a year, it is possible
that some social security benefits
can be paid. For each \$2 of
earnings over \$1200, only \$1 of a
beneficiary's social security payments is withheld. For earnings
above \$1700, an additional \$1 in
social security benefits is withheld for each \$1 in earnings.

However, regardless of total
earnings for a year, the claimant

However, regardless of total earnings for a year, the claimant can receive full benefits for any month in which he earned \$100 or less, and did not "render substantial services" in self-employment. An application must, of course, be filed before any benefits can be paid. fits can be paid.

Therefore, if you, are over 65 and still working, you should definitely consult your social security district office at 132 N. First St., in Older in Olean.
