Alfred Tech To Have Historical Collection

A special and rare book collection will be housed in the new library now under construction at the State University Agricultural and Technical Institute at Alfred.

A special room in the library has been allotted for the collection, according to Roland D. Hale, chairman of the library committee.

The committee is presently searching for area residents who have books, periodicals, pictures, or histories about Western New York which they would like to donate or to will to the Institute.

"The collection will include memorabilia from Steuben, Cattaraugus, Chatauga, Erie, Monroe, and Allegany Counties", Mr. Hale said. He added that the collection will focus on Allegany County where the two-year college is located.

"Those documents donated or willed will be marked with a special plaque bearing the donor's name," he stated.

Mr. Hale said that those who have publications or pictures to give to the Institute may contact him or Erwin Mapp, librarian, in care of the Agricultural and Technical Institute at Alfred.

The completion date for the library, which will cost approximately \$850,000, is July, 1966. However, an area in the present library has been set aside for the collection until it can be moved to the new facility.

Alfred Tech President David H. Huntington called the historical room, "an excellent idea." "I believe the preservation of these historical documents is a part of the responsibility of the State of New York and Alfred Tech, and I am pleased that our new library will make this possible."

The three-story brick, glass, and panel structure will contain, in addition to the historical room, a listening room for tape recordings

and records, conference rooms, and a book bindery and repair facility. It will have a capacity for 100,000 volumes and seating space for from 600 to 800 students.
