

James Jackson, "Fireman of the Year" Honored at Testimonial Dinner

James H. Jackson, local Fireman who received the coveted New York State "Fireman of the Year" award, was honored at a dinner program sponsored by the local Fire Prevention Week Committee, at the Andover Central School Saturday evening, Oct. 10, 1964.

A delicious turkey dinner, prepared by the Firemen's Auxiliary and served by the ACS Cafeteria Help, was enjoyed by the many guests and local citizens that took the trouble to show their respect for our local hero.

Only 48 local people attended the interesting program which climaxed the annual Fire Prevention Week Campaign.

Reverend Willis V. Poole, Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, opened the program with an appropriate prayer, followed by Ronald Taylor, President of the local Fire Department, who spoke briefly and then introduced Mayor Paul Kilbane.

Mayor Kilbane gave a brief welcoming speech to the honored guests, praised "Jim's" heroic rescue, and apologized for the lack of interest shown by Village residents.

Mr. James H. Kessler was then introduced by Mr. Taylor and gave a brief talk on the value of Fire Prevention. He reported that during the most recent fire drill at the School, the entire building was emptied in 3 minutes which is certainly record time.

Walter Hand, Secretary of Allegany County Volunteer Firemen's Association from Belmont, was then introduced and told of having worked with and known "Jim's" father, Claire Jackson, for many years while they were employed at the Sinclair Refinery in Wellsville. He gave one of the slogans used in Fire Prevention which is: "The ashes you pick up in the morning—may be Yours"—so be careful!

Herbert Stoeckel, President of Erie County Volunteer Firemen's Assn., and awards Chairman for the Western N. Y. Assn., was then introduced and gave the history and the winners in the past of the "Fireman of the Year" award in Western New York.

William Bardollar, 1st Vice President of the Western New York Volunteer Firemen's Association, was then introduced and gave a brief talk which included

the message that "Fire Prevention is not a 1 week shot—but a 365 Day a year program". He also reported on the importance of a First Aid Squad in saving lives, the history of which is little known to the general public.

"Jim" Jackson was then introduced and instead of giving a speech told several stories and was then presented with a huge 20" x 24" picture taken at the time when he was presented with the State Award.

A colored movie on the tragic Chicago School Fire a few years ago was then present by Mr. Carmody, Chairman of the Fire Prevention Week Program, which showed the stark tragedy where over 90 children lost their lives in a short span of but a few minutes.

The program was then closed with Rev. Poole giving the benediction.

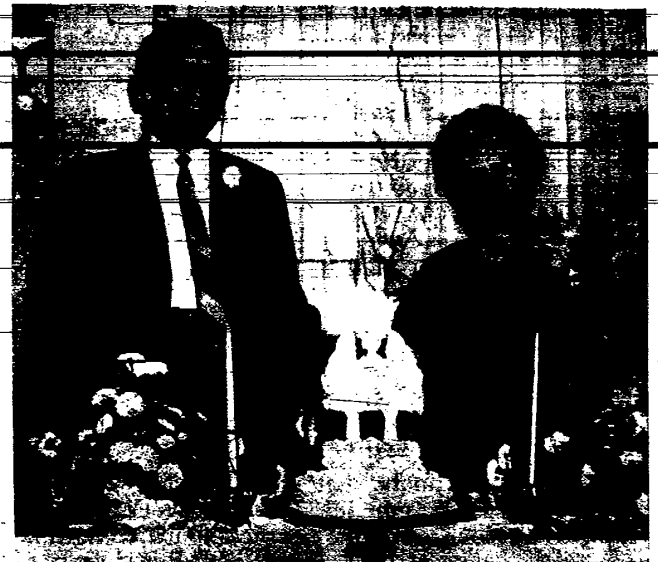
Enter College
