Dairy Princess To Speak At Arkport October 16

Marjorie Jean Heath, 22-year-old New York State Dairy Princess, will be the featured speaker at the annual meeting of District 14, American Dairy Association and Dairy Council of New York, in the Arkport Central School on Friday, October 16, at 8 p. m.

The meeting is open to all dairy farmers in the district, which comprises Allegany, Livingston, Steuben and Wyoming Counties.

Marjorie was selected State Dairy Princess during a two-day contest held in Syracuse on Sept. 3 and 4. In all, 22 girls competed for the title. She will spend the next year "speaking up" for milk for the more than 40,000 dairy farmers in the Empire State.

The youngest of seven children of Mr. and Mrs. Merton Heath of Chenango Forks (Broome County) she grew up on her father's 202-acre dairy farm where the family has always maintained a herd of Holsteins.

Prior to taking over her duties as State Dairy Princess, Marjorie was employed as a bookkeeper for a Binghamton florist.
