Yellow Light Means Zaution-Not Stop

The State Department of Motor The State Department of Motor Vehicles today cleared up an apparent misunderstanding of the meaning of the yellow light in a three-colored traffic signal as contanied in the revised "Rules of the Road" which went into effect on October 1.

The rile reads: "Webicular traffic

The rule reads: "Vehicular traf-

October 1.

The rule reads: "Vehicular traffic facing a steady yellow signal is thereby warned that the related green movement is being terminated or that a red indication will be exhibited immediately—thereafter when vehicular traffic shall not enter the intersection.

"Pedestrians facing a steady yellow signal, unless otherwise directed by a pedestrian-control signal, are thereby advised that there is insufficient time to cross the roadway before a red indication is shown and no pedetrian shall then start to cross the roadway."

As interpreted by the Department, the yellow signal serves as a warning that the red (or stop) signal is coming on within secconds. When, the red signal is shown, vehicular or pedestrian traffic shall enter the intersection. In some instances, published reports of the rule maintained that the yellow signal means "stop", which is not true, according to the Department. Vehicles already within the intersection or those so close as to be unable to stop safely may proceed through the intersection. close as to be unable to stop safely may proceed through the intersec-tion if they can do so before the red signal comes on.

"The spirit of the rule, however, is to end the practice of some drivers who deliberately try to beat the red light," Commissioner William S. Hults said, "thereby creating a possible dangerous situation for other differences. erous situation for other drivers rightfully using the intersection. Drivers should be alert to the possibility that a traffic signal may change to red before they reach the intersection and, therefore, be prepared to stop when the yellow signal flashes on," he recommended ommended.
