Harold Wycoff of Petrolia, a former Elm Valley resident, happened to be driving along and saw a pair of feet sticking out from underneath the tractor and stopped his car to investigate. Finding the lad hopelessly pinned down, he dashed back to his car, secured the auto jack, and raised the tractor off the young man and pulled him out from under it.

In the meantime, "Tim's" brother came along and dashed back to the Wahl residence and reported the accident with an ambulance being called to the scene where Mr. Wycoff was remaining with the injured lad.

However, it wasn't until later on when "The Good Samaritan" called the family to check on the young man's condition, that the Wahl family found out the name of their benefactor.

According to the latest report "Tim" is recovering from his injuries which included crushed ribs and internal injuries. His family is reported to have stated that if it hadn't been for the timely rescue by Mr. Wycoff, that the injuries would more than likely have been fatal to their son since the weight of the tractor was smothering him.

When something like this happens, it sort of restores one's faith in human nature doesn't it?

Congressman Goodell Speaks At Wellsville Luncheon

Speaking at a luncheon meeting of the Allegany County Republican Women at the Country Club in Wellsville, recently, Congressman Goodell said that, "Whatever the outcome of this election, Americans must resolve to cleanse our system of certain relatively new doctrines that are eating away at our very foundations. Among them are:

1. **Judicial Power** — The new doctrine that the Federal Judiciary may substantially amend our Constitution and rewrite laws. This is a power reserved to the people through the elected legislative representatives of the people. Those who praise present Judicial

particular court decision will find themselves attacking the Court tomorrow for usurpations they do not like. Many of us who revere our Judicial system rebel against its invasion into the political arena where, in the long run, it can only come into disrepute.

2. **Presidential Powers** — The personality cult which not only recognizes the Presidency as a major symbol of our country but also insists that we can solve our problems only by concentrating ever greater power and influence in the President's hands.

3. **Equal Rights** — the doctrine that equal opportunity really means equal rewards regardless of achievements.

4. **Apportionment** — The simplistic doctrine that no factor other than population should be reflected in the apportionment of our legislative bodies. Each of us is a member of a minority of one nation or another. In this doctrine germinates the seeds that could destroy all guarantees of "mobocracy".

5. **Prayer and Bible Reading** — The doctrine that if a majority of our people want to pray or read scriptures in public one way, and the minority in another way, the minority's rights is to stop only way the majority can respect praying and reading the Bible in public schools and public places. This is really a form on nihilism which contradicts the whole meaning of the great American experiment.

"If we who believe these doctrines are wrong and dangerous to our country, as we know it, are to succeed, we must preserve in our efforts to expunge them, with all the energy and dedication we can command."
