Editorially, we have announced our position and are urging all voters to vote NO against Amend-

our position and are urging all voters to vote NO against Amendment No. 1, and Proposition No. 1.

Both of them are steeped in Legal Language that might make it appear that it isn't going to cost the voters anything if they do support them—because after all it will come from State Funds.

Don't let anyone kid you about where all this money comes from, It Comes From You. -Whether you are a renter or an owner of taxpaying property, you are paying more for your home so that other people can pay less for theirs under these government housing programs.

You pay in two ways. You pay in your State Taxes and you pay in property taxes on the house you own or rent. That is true for 2 reasons:

1. The cash that the State gives n. Ine cash that the State gives away to subsidize government housing must be collected by the State through the State Taxes that you have State through that you pay.

2. The exemption from local taxes that the government-owned housing does not pay must be made up by additional taxes on the homes and other taxpaying property that you own or rent. Halt these higher housing costs by voting NO!
