### Development Campaign Chairman Announced

Samuel D. Lunt of New York, an investment banker with offices in New York and Buffalo, has accepted the post as Chairman of Alfred University's \$15,505,000 Development Campaign, President M. Ellis Drake has announced.

Mr. Lunt, who has been a University Trustee since 1956, will be presented to an estimated 300 area residents attending a Leadership Dinner in Ade Hall in Alfred, Friday night, October 23. He is expected to announce the names of Chairmen of several special committees which will begin work this fall to raise funds for construction of new buildings costing \$6,000,000 which are listed as first priority needs.

The dinner will follow the annual fall meeting of the Board of Trustees, which last June adopted a Master Plan calling for a 26 percent increase in enrollment and providing in the next ten years nine new buildings, renovation of some existing structures, new athletic fields, and increased endowment.

Dr. Finla G. Crawford of Andover, Chairman of the Board of Trustees and former Vice Chancellor of Syracuse University, will preside at the dinner. President Drake will outline goals of the campaign and will present Chairman Lunt.

Two Immunization Clinics will be held at the Andover Central School under the direction of Dr. S. B. Scott, Health Officer.

Children can be protected against Diphtheria, Pertussis (Whooping Cough), Tetanus (Lockjaw), Smallpox and Polio-myelitis.

Immunization for your child should be done by your family physician. If this cannot be done by your doctor, the Health Department in cooperation with the Education Department is holding two clinics at the Andover Central School.

Children from three months of age may receive protection at these clinics.

First Clinic—Friday, November 6, 1964 at 9:30 A. M. — 1st dose of Triple and Double Toxoid (Diphtheria, Pertussis and Tetanus). Salk Polio Vaccine, 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th doses.

Second Clinic—Thursday, December 3, 1964 at 9:30 A. M. — 2nd doses of Triple and Double Toxoid. Smallpox Vaccination—Salk Polio Vaccine 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th doses.

### News That's Print To Fit

Editorially, we have announced our position and are urging all voters to vote NO against Amendment No. 1, and Proposition No. 1.

Both of them are steeped in Legal Language that might make it appear that it isn't going to cost the voters anything if they do support them—because after all it will come from State Funds.

Don't let anyone kid you about where all this money comes from, It Comes From You. Whether you are a renter or an owner of tax-paying property, you are paying more for your home so that other people can pay less for theirs under these government housing programs.

You pay in two ways. You pay in your State Taxes and you pay in property taxes on the house you own or rent. That is true for 2 reasons:

1. The cash that the State gives away to subsidize government housing must be collected by the State through the State Taxes that you pay.
2. The exemption from local taxes that the government-owned housing does not pay must be made up by additional taxes on the homes and other taxpaying property that you own or rent. Half these higher housing costs by voting NO!

Get-out-the-vote campaigns have been a part of national elections for a great many years. Of late, however, something new and eminently worthwhile has been added. More and more of these campaigns stress that it is the duty of the voter to seriously and thoroughly study the issues and evaluate the candidates before entering the polling booth.

An uninformed vote is worse than no vote at all. The policies and principles that are adopted now, with the consent of the electorate, are those which will do much to determine this nation's future. They will, in many instances, profoundly affect the lives and opportunities of our children and our children's children. It cannot too often be repeated that an informed people is the first essential to the continuity of our institutions and our freedoms.

By all means, vote the fact that so many million qualified Americans commonly stay away from the polls has long been a national disgrace. But, above all, know what and who you are voting for.

The U. S. News & World Report has published a chart that every taxpayer should study. It shows the incredible growth of federal subsidies to the states and local governments.

In 1954, this spending totaled \$2.7 billion. The figure for the current year is \$10.2 billion. Next year, according to official estimates, it will reach \$10.6 billion.

A very large part of this goes for a lengthy list of aid and welfare projects, along with such innovations as federally-financed slum clearance and housing developments. And, staggering as the dollar figures are, they can't tell the worst part of the story. That part lies in the steady erosion of state and local rights, obligations and responsibilities.

We are closer to a Welfare State than the majority of people realize. Unless the trend is checked somehow, the end result on the American character, as well as the American pocketbook will be disastrous.

### County Civil Defense To Conduct Fall Test

On Friday, Oct. 30th the County Civil Defense Office will be conducting an annual Fall Test including public participation.

At 2:45 P. M., the "TAKE COVER" signal will be sounded indicating to the public that if this were not a test they would proceed to their "nearest shelter".

During the period between 2:45 P. M., and the sounding of the "ALERT" signal at 3:45 P. M., traffic controls will be invoked testing the procedures so that people may get from the place where they are to the nearest shelter. During the period between the sounding of the "TAKE COVER" and the "ALERT" schools will be practicing their "Go Home" drills and other "Go to Shelter" activities will be in progress.

The County staff and Local Deputy Directors throughout the County will run a test of their operators until 10:30 that evening.

Director Robert L. Coulter in commenting on this said: "The sounding of the 'ALERT' signal at 3:45 P. M., is used for the test simply to indicate the end of the public participation activities; normally this would mean 'prepare to receive information'."
