Allegany County Stocks Reforestation Ponds

Carl Burdick, forest supervisor for the Allegany County Refores-tation Committee has stocked 8 ponds this year in cooperation with the Allegany County Soil and Water Conservation District and the U. S. Department of Interior.

The bluegills stocked on October 9th should reproduce in 1965 providing feed for the bass.

Trout were stocked on June 18, 1964 in the ponds on the Engle and Spruce Lots. Here there could be come fishing in 1965. Trout ponds usually do not remain stocked ever two or three years as there are only a few ponds in the county where trout reproduce successfully.

Abstract of Proposed Amendment Number One

This proposed amendment removes existing specific reference in the Constitution to low-rent housing and authorizes legislation permitting the State, municipal, and public corporations to expand funds for housing, urban renewal, and rehabilitation of substandard dwellings when it is determined, pursuant to law that the need therefor cannot be met by the unaided operations of prayate entertherefor cannot be met by the unaided operations of private enterprise. This amendment provides
that the maximum debt light of
cities, towns and rilages for in barrenewal shall be based upon the
full valuation of taxable rearestate within their porders instead
of assessed value; permits the
State Comptroller to determine the
amount of self-liquidating muncipal indebtedness incurred for
urban renewal; excludes all temicipal indebtedness incurred for urban renewal; excludes all tem-porary urban renewal financing from constitutional debt limits; and permits the rehabilitation of substandard dwellings through State and municipal loans to own-ers of such properties.

Abstract of Proposed Amendment Number Iwo

Number Iwo

This amendment, recommended by the Temporary State Commission on Revision and Simplification of the Constitution, would remove material which is considered obsolete and superfluous. The proposed amendment repeals subsection (b) of section 7 of Article I of the Constitution which enumerates the bodies or officers charged with ascertaining the value of private property taken for a public use when the compensation is not made by the State; removes superfluous language from section 6 of Article III on

salaries of members of the Legis-lature; deletes language from sec-tion 17 of Article III relating to tion 17 of Article III relating to authorizing the construction and operation of street railroads; deletes from section 13 of Article III a provision relating to the construction of statutes fixing the time within which claims against the State must be submitted or allowed; amends section 6 of Article V deleting provisions regarding special veterans' preferences granted certain veterans taking civil service examinations prior to January 1, 1951, and prior to January 1, 1951, makes other changes in the form of this section.

The purpose and effect of this proposition is to authorize the creation of an additional State debt in the aggregate amount of \$165,000,000 by the issuance and sale by the State Comptroller of state bonds, the proceeds of which are appropriated to the State Pivision of Housing and Community Renewal, which amountainay be loaned to municipalities and local housing authorities for slum clearance and low rent housing, projects. This proposition would also increase the maximum also increase the maximum amount of punual cash payments for housing subsidies by \$7,500,000. Such subsidies are paid by the State to a municipality or a housing authority to assure the low-rent character of public housing
