Or make sure that your boy knows the proper way to handle a gun and also knows the State Conservavation Laws and Regulations in effect in your locality. FOR ALL HUNTERS: ALWAYS consider every gun loaded until proven otherwise.

Never shoot at ANYTHING THAT MOVES. Be sure and identify any game before shooting at it—we ports the surplus food arrives ing the importance of fire drills have never seen a hunter yet that looked like a deerwhen it was close enough to identify it as a Buck or come from 9:30 to noon.

Never stand loaded guns, or lay them on the ground, whenever there are dogs or children anywhere near. An excited animal or child could easily knock a weapon down or bump it so it could accidently discharge. ALSO Keep Both Guns and Ammunition away from children!

Never use a gun for a crutch or an arm-rest—it could go off and leave you—arm-less!

Finally — Be ABSOLUTELY SURE That Guns carried into Camp or Home are unloaded. Then keep them locked up!

We are sure that if all of our readers follow these suggestions, they are very likely to be around to hunt again — another season! So-o- Happy Hunting!
