A total of 361 votes were cast in Greenwood Election Day, including ten absentee and four military votes. The usual Republican town-gave the lead to the Presidential Johnson, Humphrey ticket 209 to Goldwater, Miller 145. For U. S. Senator the vote was for Keating 246 to Kennedy 109. The Election Board recording the vote at the Masonic Hall was: Genevieve Williamson, Nina Stephens, Bernice Osmin and Jacqueline Murphy. Mrs Gertrude Stephens was the vote watcher for the Republican Party. James Shaut was appointed this Fall as Custodian of the voting machine. Town Clerk, Marjorie York delivered the voting returns to Bath Wednesday.

Expressing a concern over the danger of runaway trucks descending Greenwood Hill on Route 17, the members of the Greenwood Masonic Lodge, Sentinel No. 151, noted at their last meeting to seek action to eliminate the hazard, according to an announcement by John Hunt, Master of the Lodge.

Accordingly a resolution was sent to the District 6 Office of the New York State Department of Highway requesting steps to eradicate the peril to life and property.

"The Town Board of Greenwood and other organizations of the Community will be invited to discuss the problem and to take similar action if the program is of interest to them", Hunt said.

The western approach to the hamlet of Greenwood is a two mile hill deceptive in its grade and ending dead end in the center of the village. Many trucks have burned out their brakes or for some other reason have been unable to stop and have rolled into the "T" intersection out of control tipping over and striking buildings and cars. The intersection is controlled by a flashing red light against traffic approaching the dead end.

Local residents feel it is miraculous that no injuries or fatalities to residents have occurred but there have been some close escapes. Some of the drivers have received minor injuries.

Some of the buildings have been damaged many times. The last wreckage was September when a trailer load of potatoes out of control rolled over barely missing two persons setting in parked cars.

In the resolution it was pointed out that the school bus routes use the intersection and that being in the center of the Community people and cars are always

present. The resolution also pointed out that modern trucks are larger, travel faster, and often carry cargos highly dangerous.

Raymond Duke attended State University of Cortland for six weeks for a course in Concept of Modern Mathematics.


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
