VILLAGE ORDINANCES

The Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover, County of Allegany and State of New York, does on the 10th day of November 1964, hereby propose the following ordinance to regulate traffic on the highways within the corporate limits of the Village of Andover and a public hearing will be held on said ordinances on Tuesday, November 24th, 1964, at 7:00 P. M., at the Village Office, Andover, N. Y.

ARTICLE VII

The following Sections and Subdivisions of Article VII are hereby repealed.

Section 10, Subdiv. (d), number 1 and 2, being regulations concerning Through Highways, and the following new Section 10, Subdiv. (d), numbers 1 and 2, are hereby enacted as follows:

Section 10, Subdiv. (d), as follows: Water Street from the Southwest and East Valley Road from the Northeast is hereby designated as a through highway between the intersection of Water Street with Route 21 on the West and on the East Valley Road at the Northeastly village limits and Yield Signs shall be erected on the following entrances thereto:

1. Barney Street from the north.
2. Barney Street from the south.

County Doctors Form Heart Association

After careful consideration, the physicians of Allegany County as well as the officers of the Allegany Heart Chapter have decided to divorce itself from the New York State and National Organization and form an autonomous group to be known as the Allegany Heart Association, Incorporated, Box 132, Wellsville, New York.

The reasons which initiated the considering of this action are as follows:

1. To better utilize the funds collected locally for Allegany County by offering the following:

2. To continue the Prophylactic Penicillin Program to prevent recurrence of Rheumatic Fever and to reestablish the diagnostic Heart service available to the needy patients, thereby assuring that no one will be without diagnostic cardiac-vascular Evaluation regardless of his financial status.

3. To give financial aid to individuals which is principally disapproved by the National organization and to furnish needy patients with transportation to the Heart Clinic.

4. To forward available funds for research directly to an institution designated by the Board of Directors. Under the form set up a large portion of the funds was outgoing before reaching research.

Any future donations or memorials to the Allegany Heart Association will be appreciated and utilized to the fullest.

Miss Helen L. Brown

Missionary Convention Christian & Missionary Alliance Church

A missionary who cautions Americans "not to feel sorry for the missionaries working in Africa where there is opportunity for exciting living and service in newly-created republics trying on their independence as new robes of State" will come here to speak in a missionary conference.

She is Miss Helen L. Brown, living in Kalispell, Montana, during her year's furlough from service in the Ivory Coast in West Africa. She is to be one of the guest speakers during the annual missionary convention in the Christian & Missionary Alliance Church, located at Rehambeau Ave., Andover, N. Y.

Miss Brown was assigned to Africa by The Christian and Missionary Alliance, which maintains missions in Ivory Coast, Guinea, Mali and Upper Volta, the Congo and Gabon. She arrived in the Ivory Coast in 1949, and during the past 12 years has taught in the Bible School in the city of Bouake, second largest city in the country.

"At a recent meeting of all the national Christian workers in the Baoule language in an assembly of 50 men I counted 46 who had been in my Bible School classes from 1949 to four years ago," she counts.

She reports also that before her recent return to this country, she witnessed the repentance of a young African witch doctor and because of the power of the Christian gospel, saw him destroy his own spirit fetishes inherited from his father.
