**Soil Conservation News**

Wendell Chamberlain, Grange member of the Allegany County Soil & Water Conservation District Directors, says the district is looking forward to Allegany County landowners planting one thousand acres of trees each year for the next five years. He says that five thousand acres of trees would in fifty years produce a timber crop that we can ill afford to miss. We will not have this crop unless we plant them now.

He also recommends that tree orders should be sent in as soon as possible for 1965 spring planting. Order forms are available by contacting the Allegany County Soil & Water Conservation District Office at Belmont, New York.

Mr. Hugh Chamberlain, chairman of the Allegany County Soil & Water Conservation District Directors announces that shrubs will be available to District cooperators for planting in 1965. There will be eight species of shrubs and four species of conifer trees for wildlife planting. Shrubs available are: Autumn olive, Highbush cranberry, Multiflora rose, Purple Osier willow, Crabapple, Bittersweet, Silky dogwood and American plum. Trees available are: Norway Spruce, White spruce, White pine and Red pine. This wildlife planting material is made available through a memorandum of understanding with the New York State Conservation Department.

Plants must be ordered in multiples of fifty. No more than three hundred conifer trees are available for clump planting to each cooperator. Shrub order forms are available by contacting Allegany County Soil & Water Conservation District Office, Library Bldg., Belmont, New York.
