½ tsp. vanilla  
Sift together and stir in  
½ cup sifted flour  
½ tsp. salt  
½ tsp. baking powder

1 cup cut-up walnuts  
cups finely cup-up dates  
Spread in well greased 8" square pan. Bake until top has dull crust  
Temperature: 325 (slow moderate oven) Time Bake 25 to 30 min.
