

## Have You Checked Your Chauffeurs License

New York State licensed chauffeurs whose licenses expire at the end of this month were reminded today by the Department of Motor Vehicles that they have only four days in which to do so.

The great majority of the 150,000 of these drivers who received punch card renewal applications during the first week of November through the mail already have had their renewals processed. But there always are some who wait until the last minute and unless they visit the nearest issuing office within the next four days, they will not be driving legally on December 1.

Motor vehicle issuing offices will not be open Thanksgiving Day of course, or on the following Saturday. The licenses expire at midnight on Monday, November 30.

All Department District Offices, except those in Binghamton, Minerva and White Plains, process renewal applications. So do all County Clerks except those in the five counties which comprise New York City, Albany and Oneida where District Offices are located.

Roughly 50,000 of the chauffeurs scheduled to renew their licenses must present evidence that their eyesight meets the vision standard of 20/40 in effect in this state. This evidence can be a certificate from a private eye specialist or the chauffeur may take the eye test at a Department issuing office.

## Coed From Andover On Deaf Field Hockey Team

Betty York, of Andover, N. Y., helped to make this the best field hockey season for Gallaudet College, the world's only college for the deaf, Washington, D. C.

A freshman, Miss York served as captain for one game and played left and right fullback positions on the team which has a record of three wins, one tie, and three losses.

The Gallaudet deaf coeds won over Immaculata College, 2-0; over the Catholic University of America, 2-0; and over Washington Webster College, 1-0. They tied George Washington University, 0-0; and lost to the American University, Trinity College, and the University of Maryland.

At a Sports Day at the University of Maryland on October 31, Gallaudet's team scored 1-0 against Baltimore Junior College, and 3-0 against Bowie State College. It tied Frostburg State College 0-0, and Saint Mary's Seminary 4-4.

In addition to varsity field hockey, Miss York participated in intramural sports and is manager of the women's intramural basketball program.

Miss York is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clinton York of R. D. 2, Andover, and a graduate of the Rochester, N. Y., School for the Deaf.

Miss Dorothy Hamburg from Conway, Arkansas, is the coach of the hockey team.

## Whitesville Holstein Is Named Gold Medal Dam

A Registered Holstein cow in the Lewis Waters herd at Whitesville, N. Y., has been named a Gold Medal Dam by Holstein-Friesian Association of America. Forest Greene Masterpiece Mary 4062904 (87) has qualified for the recognition on the basis of milk production, pleasing body type, and the ability to transmit these attributes to offspring.

Forest Greene Masterpiece Mary has three official lactation records averaging 20,454 lbs. of milk and 783 lbs. of butterfat. She has three qualifying daughters that meet or exceed requirements for type and production. They are: Forest Greene Dean Masterpiece (84), with three records averaging 18,662 lbs. of milk and 699 lbs. of butterfat; Forest Greene Redwood Mary (82) with two records averaging 20,954 lbs. of milk and 877 lbs. of butterfat; and Forest Greene Sears Mary (82) with a single record of 17,325 lbs. of milk and 716 lbs of butterfat.

All records mentioned above have been converted to a 305-day, two milkings per day, mature equivalent basis for comparison purposes.

In qualifying for the Gold Medal Dam recognition, this 11-year-old name added to the Holstein Association's roster of "super brood Registered Holstein will have her cows" of the breed. She was bred and developed in the herd of her present owner, Mr. Waters.
