Notice Of Adoption of Village Ordinance For The Regulation Of Traffic

At a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover held in the Village Office, Andover, N. Y., on Tuesday evening, November 24th, 1964, after a public hearing held as required by law after due notice published in the Andover News, the following ordinance was adopted, regulating traffic upon the highways within the corporate limits of the Village of Andover, Allegany County, N. Y.

It is ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover as follows:

ARTICLE VII

The following Sections and Subdivisions of Article VII of the Ordinances of the Village of Andover are hereby repealed.

Section 10, Subdiv. (d), numbers 1 and 2, being regulations concerning Through Highways, and the following new Section 10, Subdiv. (d), numbers 1 and 2, are hereby enacted as follows:

Section 10, Subdiv. (d), as follows: Water Street from the Southwest and East Valley Road from the Northeast is hereby designated as a through highway between the intersection of Water Street with Route 21 on the West and on the East Valley Road at the Northeasterly village limits and YIELD Signs shall be erected on the following entrances thereto:

1. Barney Street from the north.
2. Barney Street from the south.

THIS IS TO CERTIFY that the above is a correct and true copy of the Ordinance duly passed at a Special Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover, held at the Village Office, Andover, N. Y., on Tuesday, November 24, 1964 after a public hearing at which there was no opposition, which Ordinance has been duly entered in the Minute Book of the Village of Andover.

This Ordinance is to take effect on and after December 7th, 1964. Dated this 24th day of November 1964.

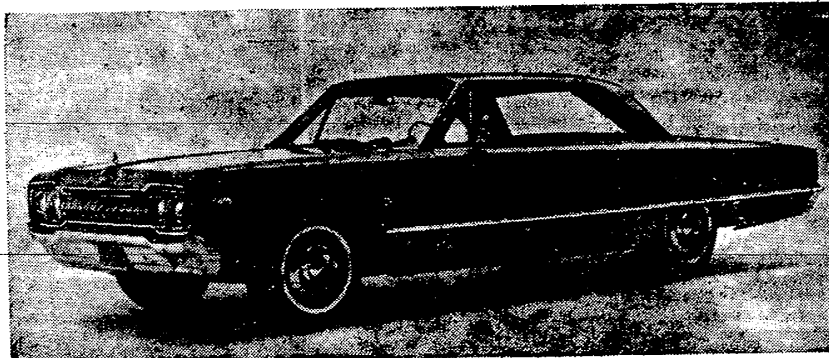

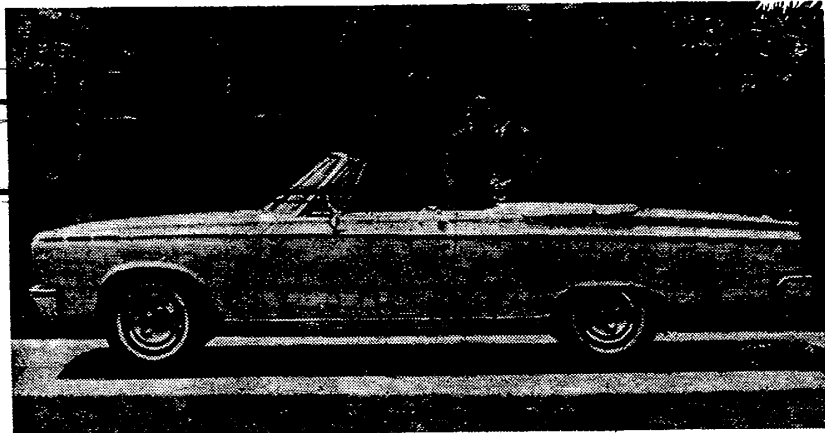

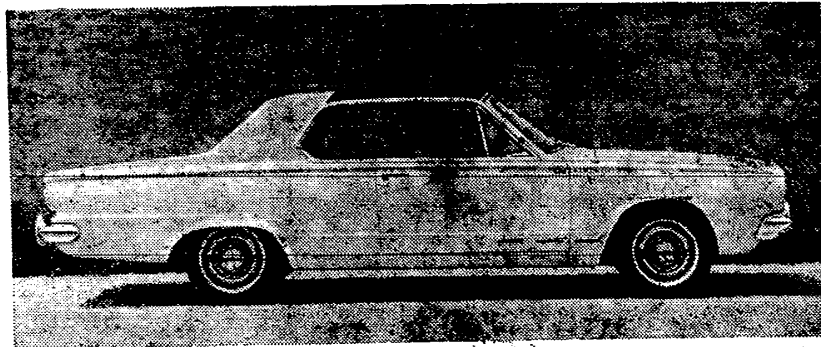
ALL NEW DODGE POLARA. The two-door hardtop, one of six luxurious models in the Polara Line on a 121-inch wheelbase for 1965.
