 Giving Of Thanks
 1621 - 1964

"Today we give our thanks, most of all, for the ideals of honor and faith we inherit from our forefathers — for the decency of purpose, steadfastness of resolve and strength of will, for the courage and the humility, which they possessed and which we must seek everyday to emulate. As we express our gratitude, we must never forget that the highest appreciation is not to utter words—but to live by them."

For 343 years Americans have lived with the ideas expressed in the late President's proclamation. Whether or not they have lived by the examples which their forefathers have set for them is a matter of history.

In many ways, Americans have carried on and lived by these ideals. But there have been some ways in which the ideals of honor and faith, decency and humility have changed and perhaps suffered. Americans now live in such a complex world that it is not always easy to abide by the prudent and simple rules by which our forefathers lived. For instance, at that first Thanksgiving in 1621, the Pilgrims thought nothing of feasting with the Indians. They were grateful to them for their assistance in establishing a new life. The color or beliefs of the red men did not interfere with the feelings of gratitude and brotherhood that the Pilgrims felt for them. Unfortunately, today, these feelings and ideals have given way to prejudices and ill-feelings between those of different colors or races.

Perhaps in future years, it can be recorded in the history books that these differences have been resolved.

The basic ideals and formulas used by the first Americans have been, thus far, carried down to us. Let us be thankful for this and hope further that our children and their children will be able to say the same when they prepare to give thanks.

Kitchen Korner

Gumdrop Cookies

Here is a quick and easy recipe. It only takes a few minutes.

1 cup shortening
 1 cup granulated sugar
 1 cup brown sugar
 2 eggs
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1teaspoon baking powder
 2 cups sifted enriched flour
 1/4 teaspoon soda
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 2 cups quick-cooking oats
 1 cup coconut
 1 cup gumdrops cut in small pieces.

Thoroughly cream shortening and sugar; add eggs and beat well. Add vanilla. Sift dry ingredients add to creamed mixture. Add oats, coconut and gumdrops. Roll into small balls. Put on greased cookie sheet. Press flat with fork. Bake in moderate oven (375 Degrees F.) 10 minutes. Makes 6 dozen.

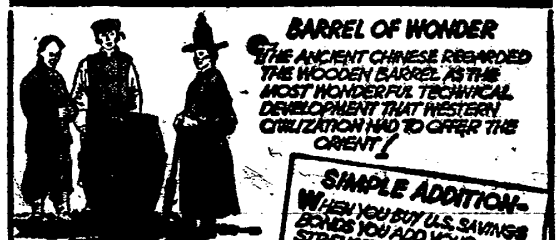
