Is YOUR CAR ready for Winter Driving or are you "Bumping around like a blind horse in a stump patch?"

This is the down-to-earth language used by one of the nation's leading traffic safety experts to describe those who drive during bad winter weather with defective automobile equipment.

According to statistics, reduced visibility and inadequate traction are the two factors during winter which make extra driving care a necessity for survival.

Drivers who neglect their windshield wipers and are too pre-occupied with daily problems to clear their windshield and windows of snow or ice are strictly "heading for an accident to happen."

Some people spend hundreds of dollars for the best kind of eye glasses and are meticulous about keeping them clean, but will still neglect to check their windshield wipers. When a storm hits — they drive almost blind — and are of course a hazard to themselves as well as everyone else on the highway.

If your wiper blades have become dried out from the summer sun, they should be replaced with live-rubber ones and the spring tension on the wiper arm should be strong enough to hold the blade firmly against the windshield when driving at average speeds.

As far as traction is concerned — drivers in this section of the country should have some type of winter tires on their back wheels at least. We have found out by experience in past winters that it also helps to have polar grip tires on the front wheels as well as the back. This enables you to stop quicker and also helps to keep your car on the road around curves and turns.

In short — Motorists TAKE CARE and DRIVE WITH CAUTION — the life you save can't be bought at an auction, besides, it could be ours — and we Do Care!

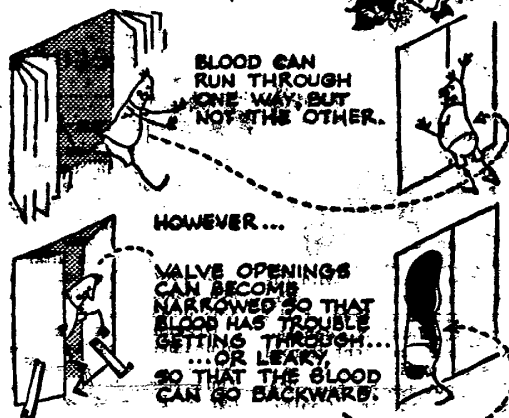
