

A fund raising drive sponsored by the coordinating committee of the Alfred University Student Senate, to provide means for purchasing and placing a monument in the Alfred Rural Cemetery for Anderson Silaa. Mr. Silaa, a promising young African student, who lost his life in a drowning accident on June 28, 1964. He wastwenty-one years of age and one of 265 students from African countries selected as the most competent and promising.

Thirty schools in New York State received grants totaling \$48,000. A \$1,000 check from the Sears Roebuck Foundation hasbeen presented to Houghton follege President Stephen W. Paine by Foundation representative, Harold Wood. Mr. Wood, who is manager of the Hornell, Sears Roebuck Store, stated that unrestricted grants totaling \$700,000 have been distributed this past week by the Foundation under a new program of aid to privately supported colleges and universities. Houghton College Vice President in Development, Dr., Robert Luckey, stated that the money will be used for the new library which opened in September. President M. Ellis Drake of Alfred University also received a check for a \$1,500 grant.

For the second time in four day, the Bolivar Magneto Company building in Weston's Mills was entered last week. Owners Jack and Richard Pounds, checking found only small change missing as result of the second break in. The owners discovered that \$170.60 and a portable radio had been stolen from the establishment.
