

1961 through 1965 models of American made passenger car production sedans having a wheel base of not less than 114 inchesmo jeeps, stations, pick-ups or convertibles.

Complete bodies, hoods, fenders, Complete bodies, noods, femers, bumpers and grills are manatory; only fender panels may be trimmed for wheel clearance. Bodies cannot be lightened or cut away except inside door and inside quar-

except inside door and inside quarter panels may be removed.

Any similar brake drum, hub or spindle may be used if it does not alter wheel base, width or learth

length.
Cars must be equipped with complete set of bumpers (bolted to finders) and grill for make and

to finders) and grill for make and model of car.

Standard ignition for make and model of car. Engines to be same manufacturer's line for make of car; mounts may be reinforced but not moved.

Carburetion limited to one four-barreled carburetar; gasoline only as fuel.

Any type passenge crar rears may be used providing no alterations are made to the body sheet metal, frame or suspension. Locked rears are permitted, but no quick-change rears allowed.

Wheels must be reinforced. In addition to' the New Cars, the Sportsman Class Specifications have been completely revamped to conform with Stateline Specifications and will resultantly be a much better class of cars as well. Excerpts from these specs are:

1932 - 1960 American mad closed cars (couples and sedans). As in new cars—no jeeps, etc.

All cars must have a body with a minimum width of 41 inches at narrowest point as measured be-tween doors at lower window frame height.

All cars must have a steel roof. Fenders can be trimmed for wheel clearance. All doors to be welded or bolted shut. Door on driver's side cannot be cut down.

Only hydraulic four - wheel Any type battery sysbrakes;

tem. Self-starter in good working or

der, mandatory.
Only 6 and 8 cylinder in-line engines or flathead V8 or V6 engines allowed. No overhead V8 or

Blocks may be bored to any size and motors may be interchanged with no limitations as long as basic rules are allowed. Motor may be moved in chassis. Any cylinder head allowed. Any manifold allowed.

Any type carburetion allowed.
No superchargers or fuel injectors

Any type camshaft, valves. valve springs and pistons allowed.

Any type water pump may be used.
Again gasoline only as fuel.

Locked rears allowed; floatin, axles with special hubs permitted. Quick change rears not allowed. No restrictions on axles, shocks. springs, etc.

Of, course there are many more items regarding radiators, steering, and on and on in both specifications too numeous to mention, as well as strictly enforced afety rules regarding; roll bars, crash bars, flewalls, placement of bat-teries and gas tanks. safety strans, shoulder harness, regulation harmet, removal of glass, adherance to starter's rules and personal conduct, and so on.
