Fate of the Belmont Borden Food Products Plant, will be left up to town and village voters who will be given an opportunity to express their desires at a Jan. 20 referendum. The plant was closed several years ago when Borden moved its operations from the area. Last year the company gave the land and buildings to the Disabled American Veterans, a national organization with headquarters in Cincinnati, Ohio. The DAV has consented to sell the entire property to the Village of Belmont and Town of Amity for a net price of \$15,000 with all taxes and liens paid. The deal includes the manufacturing plant and approximately five acres of land along the Genesee River.

The Allegany County Board of Supervisors have elected Benson L. Smith of Cuba to his fourth consecutive term as board chairman. A member of the board since 1950, Smith will receive \$1,000 a year as board chairman. In other appointments, Manley C. Ackerman of Wellsville was again designated clerk and director of assessments. He has held this office since January 1, 1958. It carries a salary of \$5,840.

Mrs. Frances Barnes of Belmont was reelected journal clerk and deputy clerk at a salary of \$5,300. She has held the office since the resignation of Mrs. Arling Saunders in 1957.

The board also accepted the recommendation of the Allegany County Republican Committee to name Gerald Maybey of Cuba as Republican commissioner of elections. He succeeds Lorenzo Utter of Friendship who did not seek reappointment. The term for Maybey is from Jan. 1, 1965 to Dec. 31, 1968.

The State University Ditory Authority has announced that the L. C. Whitford Construction Co., Inc., of Wellsville has been formally awarded a \$1,146,000 contract for the construction of a 500-seat dining hall at the State University Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred. Construction of the new dining hall is scheduled to begin this week and is to be available for student use at the beginning of the 1966 academic year.

Frank B. Finnerty, 56, of Bath, one of the State's foremost 4-H Club agents and leaders, died Tuesday night, Dec. 29 at Ira Davenport Memorial Hospital, following a brief illness.
