# Citizen National Bank Hold Annual Meeting

Meeting

The Stockholders of the Citizen National Bank of Wellsville held its Annual Meeting in the Main Banking Office at Wellsville N. Y., on Tuesday, January 12th, 1965. On behalf of the Directors Mr. Bloss, President, submitted the 70th Annual Report of the Citizens National Bank of Wellsville for the year ending December 31st, 1964. He reported net operating earnings from operations, before taxes, of \$202,073 for the year, an increase of \$22,010 or approximately 12% over the preceding year. Operating earnings before income taxes and allocations to reserves were stated at \$7.54 per share of stock against \$6.72 in 1963, an increase of \$.82 per share on the 26,780 shares of \$25 par value outstanding. Dividends of \$2 per share totalling \$53,560 were reported as having been paid in 1964. Capital Funds of the Bank including valution reserves, totalling \$2,040,057 at the year end, an increase of \$53,117 for the year. He also reported an increase in deposits for the year of \$1,181,382, making total deposits at the year end \$18,450,843 against \$17,269,461 on Recember 31st, 1963.

Agricultural vehicles — trucks used by owners only for transporting agricultural or dairy products or supplies, or for personal passenger use.

#### **PLATTSBURGH POWER RATE** IS CUT AGAIN

New York, — James A. Fitz-Patrick, Chairman of the Power Authority of the State of New York, Saturday announced Trustee approval of a rate reduction for the City of Plattsburgh which makes the community's residential rate for electric power fifth lowest in the nation. When the new schedule went into effect December 1, 1964, only two communities of over 2,500 population in Oregon and two in Washington will be paying less for electricity than the City of Plattsburgh.

After discussion between Power Authority and the Plattsburgh Electric Department a reduction of \$60,000 per annum was agreed upon and approved by Authority Trustees.

This is the fifth such reduction

This is the **fifth** such reduction This is the fifth such reduction since Authority service to the City began Jan. 1, 1959. The five reductions under Authority service have lowered the annual electrical cost to Plattsburgh by more than \$425,000 a year.
