
DO YOU WANT A SALES TAX?

Don't Let a Sales Tax Put a Noose Around Your Neck!

Less than 2 years ago many of our Allegany County Supervisors were all ready to cram a County Sales Tax down the throats of we Taxpayers.

There were no trial balloons sent up in the air to see if the local residents would stand for it or were in favor of it—they were all set to shove it through under the pretex that this money was needed for county expenditures.

Our area Newspapers did a bang-up job of alerting you Taxpayers as to what was in the wind - and you people did the rest!

Since that time, two budgets have been presented and by careful planning of expenditures — we have seen that there was no explicit need for that County Sales Tax! Yet, if they had been successful in passing it, you'd better believe they would have found a place to spend as much money as they were able to collect!

Now we are confronted with a proposed "State Sales Tax"!

In his opening message to the 1965 Legislature, Governor Rockefeller proposed a \$400 Million increase with over 20% of this to meet in State Spending rising relief costs!

Instead of trying to cut expenditures — here is an attempt to make a crying need for a Sales Tax to pay for this highly increased planned spending program.

"The Citizens Public Expenditure Survey" has recently released figures which should be brought to everyone's attention concerning so-called "hiddentaxes'

All of us know what we pay in direct taxes — income, property and the like. But few of us realize the tremendous amount we pay in unseen taxes. For example: the Survey reveals that there are 148 different hidden taxes on a pair of overalls! A quart of milk conceals 87 different taxes! A pair of shoes 126!

These taxes must be paid down the line until the product reaches the consumer. It has to be fore, every tax is passed on to the consumer.

With a Sales Tax — you would be paying tax on all these hidden taxes!

Every time State Services are increased — taxes have up. Many people today seem to forget that to spend money, the government has to take money from us (in taxes) and then spend it.

We can well be proud of the generous benefits ilable to those in need in our area. Welfare services offered make it possible to say that even the poor do not have to want for the necessities of life!



The golf pro's recommendation to a beginner is: "Keep your eye on the ball if you wish to hit it properly." The highway safety expert makes a similar suggestion to all drivers: "Keep your eyes on the road if you wish to avoid an accident."

But there is a difference in the two inetheds. In litting a golf ball, your eyes should be focused constantly on the bail until after you hit it; in diving, your eyes should not remain fixed on just the read sheed.

Motor Vehic.e Commissioner Wm. S. Hults says, "You should not stare at a fixed point on the roadway shead of you. Rather you should continually shift your eyes to get the full picture of what is up shead—traffic signs and signals, other vehicles, pedestrians preparing to cross the roadway intersections, curves, hills and other potential hazards you will face."

In short, the Commissioner suggests that you get the complete picture of the traffic situation, anticipating mistakes by other drivers and being prepared to counter them by defensive action.

As part of the Department's "Learn and Live Program," the "Learn and Live Program," the Commissioner urgs you to move your eyes levery two seconds to keep you from falling into fixed, blank staring. Begin your eye movement from a high center point, high enough to give you a broad view for a block ahead in city driving, a half-mile ahead in the country.

city driving, a hair-mile ahead in the country.
From this center point turn your eyes to the word of the road, then back to center, to the opposite side and then to center, to the rear view mirror and back to center; then repeat.
"With a little practice, you can make this eye movement pattern a matter of habit and, as a result, you always will be aware of

matter of nabit and, as a result, you always will be aware of changes in the traffic situation which affect you and be able to cope with them," he concluded.
