# LIVING UNDER LAW

#### BACK SEAT DRIVING

In the folklore of motordom, few characters rank as low as the back seat driver. His pesky, loudmouth advice (coming from



either a front or back seat) takes all the joy out of life for the longsuffering man at the wheel.

To a considerable degree, the law shares in this disdain. Back seat driving has been judicially described as "this adominable practice."

But the law isn't thinking about etiquette. It is thinking about safety. The law frowns on back seat driving because it so often rattles the driver. One court estimated that in nine cases out of 10, it does more harm than good.

Still, what about that 10th case? When safety says so, back seat driving may be not just permitted but even required. The passenger who is injured in an accident may find his right to collect damages jeopardized by his own failure to voice a protest.

Thus, a court denied the claim of an injured passenger who had made no complaint, about a speed of 30 miles an hour through a blinding mist. By his very silence, said the court, "he willingly joined the driver in testing the danger."

How can you tell when to peak up? The law will usually require such action if:

(1) you are in a position to recognize the hazard;

(2) you have reason to think that the driver will not... be careful on his own initiative; and

(3) there is time enough for your protest to do some good.

It is only natural that social amenities will have a certain amount of influence on a passenger's behavior. Understandably, a girl doesn't want to be known as a wet blanket; a boy is afraid to be called "chicken". But if you let such considerations seal your lips when the circumstances cry "DANGER!", then your forbearance may well cost you your rights to damages.

It may also cost you your life.
