VETERAN'S FACILITIES

Governor Rockefeller acted quickly this week to stimulate safeguards for the interests of veterans who would be affected by reported plans of the Veterans' Administration to close certain regional offices and other veterans' facilities in New York State.

In a telegram to Representative Emanuel Celler of Brooklyn, Chairman of the Steering Committee of the New York State Congressional Belegation, the Governor said:

ernor said:

I am deeply concerned by reports that the Veterans' Administration is planning to close the veterans' hospital and domiciliary in Bath as well as hospital facilities at Sunmount, near Tupper ies at Sunmount, near Tupper Lake, and Castle Point, near Bea-

"Such moves could mean severe such moves could mean severe hardships to the veterans served by these facilities, and to their families. Moreover, such action would have a severe impact upon the economies of the areas in-volved."

The Governor called "also dis-

The Governor called "also disturbing" the report "that the vetterans' Administration intends to close two of its five regional offices in the state, a move which would leave only one office to service the entire upstate area, Buffalo in the far western part of the state."

"I strongly urge" he said, "that the Steering Committee of the New York State Congressional Delegation under your chairman.

Delegation, under your chairman ship, eake every appropriate step to determine the basis for this apparently arbitrary action in order to assure that New York's veter-ans are not discriminated against and their interests are fully pro-
