Age and License Requirements:
To be eligible for appointment as Custodian-Bus Driver, candidates must possess an appropriate driver' license issued by the New York State Department of Motor Vehicles, and must be at least twenty one years of age. one years of age.

Candidates must be of good moral character and habits, free from any mental or physical defect that would have a tendency to incapacitate. Conviction of a felony, misdemeanor, or other viola-tion of law, or a history of mental illness or nervous disorder may bar candidates from examination

bar candidates from examination and appointment.
Duties: Sweeps, mops, washes walls, dusts and performs other cleaning duties; empties waste-baskets and disposes of rubbish; replaces light bulb: towels, soap and other supplies; cut grass, trimshrubbery; rakes leaves and geneally maintains grounds; paints rooms and equipment; repairs furniture and makes plumbing and electrical repairs; operates a lowelectrical repairs; operates a low-pressure boiler including firing & removing ashes; directs traffic for protection of school children; occasionally operates a school bus or serves as watchman; cleans and polihes busses and takes care of school garage.

Required Knowledges: Skills and Abilities: Good knowledge of building and cleaning practices, supplies and equipment, and ability to use them economically and efficiently; some knowledge of the operation and maintenance of steam boiler equipment; ability to make semi-skilled plumbing, electrical, carpentry and mechanical repairs, ability to understand and follow simple oral and written directions; willingness to perform janitorial tasks; thoroughness; dependability; good physical conditions.

Dental Care Available For Needy Senior Citizens

Many needy senior citizens of this are do not know that dental care is available to them under New York State's program of medical assistance for the aged, according to a survey reported by Dr. Thomas W. Thomas, of Warsaw, N. Y., president of the Eighth District Dental Society (Counties of Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauqua, Erie, Genesee, Niagara, Orleans and Wyoming.)

Dr. Thomas noted that the pro-

Dr. Thomas noted that the program grants to needy aged persons dental care they are otherwise unable to obtain including full and partial dentures.

To receive the assistance, he said a person must be 65 years.

To receive the assistance, he said, a person must be 65 years of age or over, and must be a bona fide resident of New York

State.
"No eligible person should hesitate to apply for the aid offered by this program," Dr. Thomas stressed. "It is the right of every needy aged citizen to seek and remitable. ceive the dental care available. Under the plan, elderly residents need not be destitute. They may have limited incomes and savings, and even own their own homes." and even own their own homes

Applications for assistance, he said, may be made personally or by letter to the public welfare official of the locality in which the person lives. If he cannot make his own application, a relative or-friend may apply for him. The amount of dental assis-

The amount of dental assistance is not fixed, it is pointed out. It changes as need and income vary. For example, reduced earnings or contributions, or increased dental need, may requirincreasing the dental assistance provided. On the other hand, a

Route 17 Funds To Be Asked For By Governor

Governor Rockefeller will ask the Legislature, in his 1965 Budget Message to appropriate sufficient money to put the entire Binghamton-Lake Erie section of the proposed Southern Tier Expressway, Route 17, under design by the end of the next fiscal year.

Estimating design costs for the 205 miles involved at \$10 million, the Governor said in a statement that he will also propose provides that he will also propose provision of funds to start the acquisition-of rights-of-way for all of the un-built portions of the Expressway.

built portions of the Expressway.

"No proposed highway is more important to New York State than the Southern Tier Expressway (Route 17)", he said. "On the acceleration of its completion depends the attainment of the great future potential of this area".

The Governor said aerial photography and mapping of the Binghamton-Lake Erie sector has been completed in the last year and he has asked the Department of Public Works to review these maps and select the exact route for the Expressway.

Declaring the letting of important construction contracts for sections of the Expressway will be announced in the near future, the

announced in the near future, the Governor said.

"All of this design work and the advanced acquisition of rights-of way plus part of the construction will be undertaken as part of the accelerated highway construction-program approved by the Legislature on my recommendation at the special session in December."
