Alfred Ag-Tech Receives Federal Grant For Needy Students

The State University Agricultural and Technical College at Alfred has received a grant of \$11,648 from the federal government for participation in its new Work-Study Program, David H. Hunt-ington, president of the two-year college, has announced.

Devised as an indifferenced.

Devised as an aid for needy college students, the Work-Study Program is one of the projects contained in the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964.

According to President Huntington, the purpose of the program "is to provide work opportunities for students from low income families who are in need of earnings to finance their education"

Under the act, the federal government grants 90 per cent of the cost of the program, with the receiving institution supplying 10 per cent. The federal grant has been matched with \$1,164 appropriation from the Alfred Tech Benevolent Association, bringing the total amount of funds for the Work-Study Program to \$13,388. The Alfred Tech Work-Study Program is expected to provide part-time employment for approximately 50 students, with each student receiving an average of \$250 during the academic semester.

The size of the grant will be determined by student need and will be directly based on family income. College officials estimate that of the 1735 students enrolled, about 300 are eligible for

The maximum number of hours a student may work is 15 per week, with compensation varying with job assignment. Among the part-time positions available to atudents are laboratory assistants, paper graders, stockroom assistants, clerk-typists, exam proctors, library aides, audio-visual aides intra-mural assistants, and maintenance helpers.

The current federal grant, for use until June 30, 1965. At which become effective Monday, is that time, the college plans to apply for federal funds for the September semester.

Robert McEnroe, assistant Dean-Counselor, will be coordinator for the Work-Study Program on the local two-year college campus.
