Mary A. Burns Retires from Post Office

Mrs. Mary A. Burns, Postmars. Mary A. Burns, Post-master, was honored at a retire-ment party last Saturday night in the Knights of Columbus Home in Hornell. About 200 persons at-tended the dinner party sponsored by her co-workers at the Andover Post Office.

A very tasty Roast Beef Dinner was enjoyed by everyone present. Mayor Paul E. Kilbane opened the ceremonies by introducing George Probasco, Postmaster at Whites-ville. Mr. Probasco presented Mrs. Burns with a Retirement Certificate from the Postmaster General citing her for 30 years continuous service to the Postal Department.

Craig Snyder who was sworn in last Saturday as Clerk in Charge related by Son's of the operations of the local Post Office and also some of Mrs. Burns experiences over the past years. He related one of the most important regulations Mary had always stressed was not only give the public good service but give it always with a smile.

The sign by the stamp window, with the office hours on it were mentioned—(5:00 p. m. closing). But in fact, the windows were never closed at that time, because service was still asked and still given. Aithough most places lock the door on the dot,—not here, through the courtesy of Mary. In through the courtesy of Mary. In fact sometimes when you wanted a Special Delivery Letter to go after Mail Closing Time, it has been arranged so same would still go, even though the pouch is hung on the mail crane waiting for the train. Or maybe your letters weren't sealed or the packages not tied with string; Mary would say okay we will take care, of that, lots of string and tape. But when Mary started for the front window, you wanted to be out of her way, because she was coming fast. In fact most people were shocked when told that she had reached the mandatory retirement age. the mandatory retirement age.

You get on the phone and call Al-

Mary attended Andover High School and graduated from the Alfred Teacher Training Class of 1913. She taught in the Rural Schools until October 23rd, 1916, when the was united in marriage. schools until October 25rd, 1910, when she was united in marriage to John A. Burns who died in 1956. However, they were able to enjoy a 40th Wedding Anniversary Party given at their home during the summer of 1956.

Mary entered the postal service in June of 1934 and was given steady employment in July 1935. During that period the office was in 3rd Class and Mary was promoted to Ass't Postmaster. In July 1945 the office was raised to 2nd Class and Mary saymed the duties. Class and Mary assumed the duties of Regular Clerk. In October 1946 Postmaster James Cheesma. 1946 Postmaster James Cheesma: died and Mary was appointed Clerk in Charge. In March 1947 she was appointed as Acting Postmaster and on 25 March 1949 she was sworn in as Postmaster. She has served in that capacity very efficiently and well until her official retirement on Sunday, 31 January, 1965.
